"National Service League" Formed By War Veterans

Non-Party Organization That Views With Alarm Reduction of the Tariff.

Toronto, Oct. 26.—Organization has been completed here of the "National Service League" of returned soldiers and others which, according to an announcement given out, will take an active part in the approaching election campaign. The statement says: "The new body is to be a non-party organization which will make its appeal for support on the ground that a most serious danger confronts this country in the event of free trade, or any sudden or drastic reduction of the tariff. The league is pledged to support a reasonable protective tariff."

Mortality Just Over Lowest In 20 Years

Pneumonia Increases, But Tuberculosis Decreases in U. S.

Washington, Oct. 26.—The Government's annual report of mortality statistics for 1920, soon to be issued, shows a total of 1,142,578 deaths in the death registration area, representing a rate of 13.1 per thousand population, as compared with 12.9 in 1910.

The 1919 rate was the lowest in any year since 1900. There was an increase in pneumonia and a marked decrease in tuberculosis.
