to the upper part of the trunk, and he raised it so as to get his trunk over the trunk of the principal trunk, so that it rested on his trunk and forehead together. Having rested a minute, he returned to the charge and pushed the tree up further, when again the props were placed under it. Thus in three or four pushes he set it upright and was then apparently so well pleased with his exploit, that it was necessary to restrain him or he would have pushed over on the other side.

When he performed his task, he was again taken round to the front of the house, where an omelette was brought for him; and the kindly-eyed man whilst he was chopping down to him; but before touching it, he made his salam for it. This he did by putting the point of his trunk to his forehead and bowing his head as he does the times. Then turning up, he dashed it against his forehead and broke the shell. The kernel was speedily extracted by that very useful instrument, his trunk, and was quickly being ground between his enormous teeth, with evident satisfaction to his huge highness. He was next told to dance which he immediately did, and went through the performance with every grace that the times allow. Then he danced, his enormous feet making deep indentations in the ground beneath. For this exhibition of his dexterity and skill, he was presented with a quarter of a rupee, (a coin about the size of a shilling), which was thrown on the ground for him. He at once made his salam for the donation, and then, picking it up, handed it to the keeper; and he was then told to go to the latter side of the temple salam to each of the company present he departed to his house.

"At the time I witnessed the above, I was near to India and all things there. Being strange to me the scene made a deep impression on my mind. But during the whole of my subsequent residence, I certainly never saw anything more surprising than the sagacity of the elephant in the matter of putting the tree in its place, and the manner in which he seemed to understand what was to be done just as well as any human being present; and the exhibition of animal power, when he strained every muscle was a splendid sight. Indeed I know not which was the most admirable, the sagacity he exhibited, or the muscular power he displayed. Both are worthy of above most of the animals of the world. I am still further to admire the wonderful works of the Creator."

**THE ARMSTRONG GUN.**—There is one feature in the statement just made by the Secretary of War which still distinguishes it from all expectations of a former character. General Feiss made a formal survey to the people of the country, which, even in the modern official language, he described as to supersede the whole existing armaments of the country. This marvellous discovery of Sir W. Armstrong's gun, a weapon conceived from the gaze of the public with such jealous care that any authentic description of its powers must be regarded as conveying to popular ears the tendency of the latest mode of warfare. Feiss' gun, which is no delusion about the efficacy of this tremendous instrument. In extent of range destructive effect, portability, and precision, it appears to possess a combination of advantages truly astounding. It weighs about one-third of an ordinary canon of corresponding calibre; it is so manoeuvrable that it can be hoisted by a far smaller number of hands, and it is so durable that 1,000 discharges produced not the least injury to the specimen piece. This gun, then, not being liable to damage or wear like the ordnance at Sebastopol or Swaborg, and not clogged with the ordinary drawbacks of weight or immovability, throws its shot with such accuracy at the distance of 1,000 yards as to be credible. The day of the "long range" was now actually come. A 32-pounder of Sir W. Armstrong's make will, when charged with 5 lb. of powder, carry a ball more than one mile and a quarter. What is its accuracy at this distance we do not learn but at 1,000 yards, or nearly two miles, its precision is as great as that of the common gun of the same calibre. At this distance, it literally hits every time in 75 on every chance a common gun, in that number of discharges, would only hit once. In other words, the destructive power of the Armstrong gun is multiplied more than fifty fold. The calculations of power into which these data could lead us are almost overwhelming. A thousand guns would be equivalent in its effects to 50 pieces of the old model. If all these inclusions are verified on a large scale—and there seems no reason why they should not—it is plain that the practice of arm: will be completely revolutionized as it was by the discovery of gunpowder itself.—Times.

**VAPOR.**—Dr. Dick, the celebrated philosopher, says there are every twelve hours, less than thirty million cubic feet of water, which is more than sufficient to supply the rivers on the earth. This immense dry of water is formed into cloud, and carried over every part of the continents; and it is this which, when it falls, it is the which fertilizes the earth. Should the process, we might say our clothing, but the vapors would not dry them, for evaporation alone produces this effect; vegetation would wither; rivers would swell the ocean; no vegetation would cease. **ASTHMA PAPER.**—Persons subject to attacks of spasmodic Asthma will receive some relief during the paroxysms, by inhaling fumes not off from burning paper prepared with saltpetre. The paper should be loose and dry, and the fumes should be inhaled by the nose, and it should not contain any fibrous wool. Four ounces of saltpetre dissolved in half of water makes a solution of sufficient strength for the purpose. The paper is soaked in this for a few minutes; then taken out and dried thoroughly. It is then cut in pieces of four inches square, and one or two pieces are inhaled when required. Paper prepared in this manner is sold by all chemists, and is very efficacious when it is burned.
