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INTERESTING LETTER

Sent By Lt.-Col. Genet From The Front

Man For Man The Canadians Superior to Boe

Lt.-Col. Genet, writing to a Brantford friend, says:—
I received your interesting letter of 26th April a few days ago. Many thanks for it. Yes, we have had some very interesting and exciting times, but the results are always in our favor. The fact is, the Boche has had his day and is fast deteriorating, whilst we are getting stronger and better every day. Man for man, we were always superior to him, but he had an enormous advantage over us in material and preparation. We have now more than balanced him in every respect. We can and do give him ten shells for every one he gives us, and by our policy of continued worry and raiding, we have broken his morale. His much vaunted discipline has almost gone to the wall, and his men for the most part are civilians in uniform rather than soldiers. The people at home in Germany seem to be more under control than their men at the front. It is quite amusing to read the reports they send home. Every time we give them a licking, the Boche reports it as a German victory. I have no doubt but that a great deal of good will come out of this war, for the British Empire, at any rate. The advantage may not be material altogether, but I think it will teach us a good many useful lessons if we will only take advantage of them. Already it has done more to weld us together than fifty years of talking could accomplish. Personally I am very well and so are the others of my family. Jack is not far from where I am, and I often see him. I have not had a day's sickness since I came to France sixteen months ago. I slightly sprained my ankle coming out of the line at the Somme, which kept me quiet for about a week. I think that is a pretty good record. I am now nearly the senior battalion commander in the Canadian corps, there being, I think, only one who has maintained his command for a longer time than I have.

I have not heard of Col. Cutcliffe's battalion being over here yet. I do not think they have left England yet. I have no Brantford officers left with me now, and only a few men. I note with interest that the 215th have gone to the seaside. I hope it will do them good. I have not seen Percy Jones for some time, but heard that he was still well. He has done excellently, by all accounts. I have Canon Hedley for our chaplain. He is doing fine work and is a general favorite. He works like a horse. The weather is glorious but rather warm. But we do not mind as long as it is not cold. My kindest regards to all my friends and yourself.
