Was then defeated on the "Bible and religious instruction in common schools" question, which he advocated. Was again elected at last g.e., and is now a member of the Executive Council. Is a Liberal of the old N.B. school and supports the Liberal Conservative Government of Can. Is a member of the Liberal Conservative Association of Westmoreland and took an active part in support of the candidates of the present Canadian Ministry.—*Dorchester, Westmoreland Co., N.B.*

HILL, GEORGE FREDERICK. (*Charlotte.*)

S. of the late Hon. George S. Hill, barrister, who was for twenty-eight years a member of the Assembly or Legislative Council of N.B. B. at St. Stephen, Charlotte Co. Feb. 1832. Ed. there and in U.S. Studied law and was admitted as an Attorney in 1854. Went into the mercantile business same year and has continued ever since. Official Assignee in bankruptcy for Charlotte Co. from 1869 until June 1878. Returned from Charlotte Co. to N.B. Assembly in 1865, at the head of the poll on anti-confederate ticket. Sat two sessions and was defeated at the election in 1866 when Confederation was carried. A Liberal and opposed to an increase of indebtedness, Provincial or Dominion.—*St. Stephen, N.B.*

HUTCHISON, DAVID ALEXANDER ERNEST. (*Northumberland.*)

Second s. of Hon. Richard Hutchison, Ex-M.P. B. 1 Jan. 1847 at Douglastown, N.B. Ed. at Chatham, N.B. M. 13 June 1871 at Chatham, N.B. Jenny, youngest dau. of R. Johnston, Esq., of Chatham. On the incorporation of the municipality of Northumberland was elected to represent the parish of Newcastle at the Council Board and was elected Warden of the municipality at the first session of the Municipal Council. Held a captaincy in militia under the old militia regulations prior to the Confederation of the Provinces. Has filled various minor offices from time to time. First returned to Parlt. at last g.e. Independent in local politics.—*Douglastown, N.B.*

JOHNSON, URBAIN, J.P. (*Kent.*)

Family came from Scotland about a century ago, and settled amongst the Acadians in the *Baie des Chaleurs*, whence descendants
