

Dragoons for escort duty to the Prince of Wales, on his visit to this Country, 1860, and received personally the thanks of H. R. H. for the service. Was for many years the leader of the Liberal party in N. B. Was a mem. of the Ex. Council, without office, from 1843 to 1845, when he resigned, and from 1848, as Atty. Genl. and leader of the Govt., until Jan. 1851, when appd. a Judge of the Supreme Court, N. B. Appd. Lieut. Governor of N. B., 14 July, 1848. Was a delegate to Eng. on subject of Crown Revenues and Civil List, 1836, and again on same subjects, 1837, and received a unanimous vote of thanks from the Assembly for the successful conduct of business; a delegate to Washington on the subject of reciprocal trade, 1850, and to Portland Railway Convention, same year, when E. & N. A. Railway was agreed upon. Attended, with the late Sir Ed. Head, a meeting of Can. Govt., at Toronto, on Colonial Questions, and again, same year, a Convention at Halifax, of the Govts. of Can., N. S. and N. B., on the same questions. Prepared the several acts of the Legislature of N. B. on Collegiate reform. Consolidated the Criminal Laws, 1849, and all the laws relating to Counties, Towns and Parishes, 1850. Was for several years prior to act of 1860, a mem. of the Council of the College of N. B. when he became a mem. of the Senate of the University. At present is *ex-officio* visitor of that institution, from which he received degree of D. C. L. Was for several years Presdt. of the Fredericton Auxiliary of the Brit. and Foreign Bible Society, until appd. Lieut. Governor, when he became patron of the Society, and also of the N. B. Auxiliary Bible Society. First returned to Parlt., in 1834.—*Government House, Fredericton.*
