In presenting the foregoing narrative, prepared by Mr. Butler, the Ladies' Missionary Association, who by urgent request took charge of this interesting Mission, lament to say that adequate funds have not been sent to them; and that the continuance of the Mission, at least in their hands, is consequently imperilled. They have employed all the means they could think of to call attention to its claims; they have sent numerous appeals to Sabbath-schools, which have been met on the part of many by a kind response. Friends in Montreal have contributed generously, but still the \$1,000 per annum needed has not been forthcoming, and at this moment there is a deficit of at least \$400.
