FOUL PLAY OR SUICIDE.



Owing to the peculiar conditions of this case, none of the parties to the conference was at lib-erty to make a statement for publicaion respecting the measures to be adopted. It is gathered that whatadopted. ever may be done in the future in a punitive way, Miss Stone must be ransomed to begin with. Probably the ransom must come from the mission board or from private contribu-tions, for the state department has no funds which may be used to pay the ransom.

The ordinary odor of cinnamon, cloves, ginger and orris root also repel them, and if one mixes these ingredients and sprinkles them in with the clothes in summe little trouble will be experienced from moths.
