SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST

Homestead Regulations

ANY even numbered section of Domini-
on lands in Manitoba or the North-
west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who
has been granted an entry for a home-
stead is required to perform the condi-
tions connected therewith under one of

(1) At least six months' residence upon
and cultivation of the land in each year
during the term of three years.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be
made at the end of three years, before
the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Home-
stead Inspector.

COAL.—Coal lands may be purchased at
\$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthra-
cite. Not more than 320 acres can be
acquired by one individual or company.

FREE MINER.—A free miner's certificate is
granted upon payment in advance of \$7.50
per annum for an individual, and from
\$50 to \$100 per annum for a company, ac-
cording to capital.

subscription may be made in instal-
ments, 10 per cent on application, 10

In the event of any subscriber for
bonds payable in instalments failing
to make payment of subsequent in-
stalments, the bonds may be sold, and
any loss incurred will be charged to
the purchaser in default.

Forms of subscription (when pay-
able by instalments) may be obtained
on application to the Treasury De-
partment.
