6. A collection of patriotic poems of a high grade, Shakespeare's magnificent eulogy of England, "The precious stone set in the silver sea", is the first. Milton, Burns, Thompson, Wordsworth, Byron, Browning, Rossetti, R. L. Stevenson, Kipling and Blake are all represented.

7. An eminent Indian statesman here shows the reason why India takes her place beside Britain with a vigour and unanimity that astonish the world.

8. Undoubted y the most masterly presentation of the Prussian mind, aspirations and temperament that has yet appeared in brief form. The evolution of the present mentality of the Prussian is traced from the rise of the German Empire and before. Every teacher should master this pamphlet—and it will require to be read more than once.

9. A powerful statement of what this war means to Great Britain. The *immediate occasion* was the call of honour, the *final necessity for* now fighting to the bitter end is the very existence of the *British Nation*.

10. This is a most interesting discussion of German national character and policy a knowledge of which is essential to any adequate understanding of the deeper causes of the War.

11. This pamphlet gives a picture of war conditions in Great Britain that should prove reassuring to us and rather disquieting to our enemies.

12. This is an appeal for recruits for Kitchener's Army, based on the heroic message sent, by Captain Norman Leslie, shortly before his death at the front.

13. An excellent summary of the aims and policy of the present school of German politicians, of the causes of the war, and the invasion of Belgium, with a clear exposition of the British case against Germany.

14. This pamphlet is re-printed from the Special War Number of the Round Table of September, 1914. It discusses Austrian-Hungarian politics, the aims of Modern Germany, the critical fortnight preceding the war and the ultimate issues in relation to the British Empire and world civilisation. An excellent presentation of the British policy which any teacher would find most valuable in inculcating the British idea of empire and freedom.

15. Another reprint from the Special War Number of the Round Table. The assassination of the Archduke, the Crises of 1908 and 1912, and the Austria-Hungarian Ultimatum are the topics dealt with. An excellent map of the racial and national boundaries in Central Europe is also included.

16. A translation of the book written by Sir Edward Cook. 16 page⁵. Might not the teacher of moderns find this French translation an excellent means of giving students, at one and the same time, work in easy supplementary reading in French and an excellent idea of the cause⁵ of the present war?
