SCOTT GOVERNMENT RETURNED

The Saskatchewan provincial elections last Thursday resulted in the return of the Scott Government by a larger majority than in the previous House. The standing of the parties, with the returns incomplete, is: Liberals, 44; Conservatives, 8; deferred elections, 2. All of Hon. Walter Scott's Ministers were re-elected by substantial majorities. Fred W. Green in Moose Jaw county, and David Railton in South Qu'Appelle were defeated, the latter by Fred W. G. Haultain, the opposition leader, with a majority of 30. George Langley is again Liberal member for Redberry, but Dr. W. Elliott, the former Conservative member for Moose Mountain, was defeated. In commenting on the results of the election, Mr. Haultain attributed his party's defeat first and foremost to reciprocity.

GRAIN GROWERS' ANNUAL

At the time of going to press the annual meeting of the Grain Growers' Grain company was being held in Winnipeg. 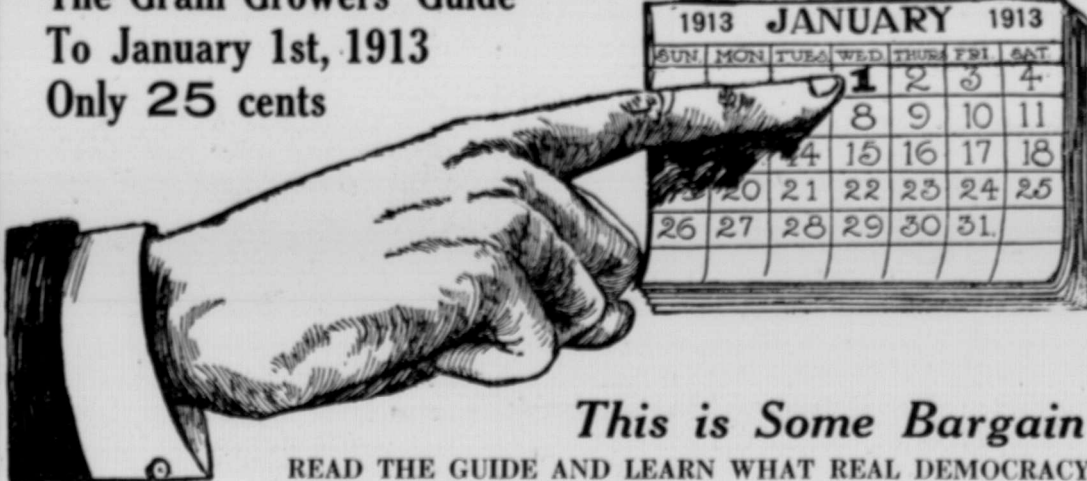
