Little Enthusiasm

The Premier's speech was received with little enthusiasm by the Opposition benches and on several occasions the murmurs of disagreement therefrom were so strong as to force him to pause.

He said that the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland would not continue his duties over any part of the country that excluded itself rom Home Rule, nor would the Dublin parliament be able to levy taxes on those districts.

In such a case it would be necessary to increase the amount of allowance to the Irish exchequer and other important adjustments would

also be necessary. The Unionists created an uproar during and after the Premier's speech, Carson leaping to his feet and shouting: "Do you not now recognize that the proposals are nothing but hypocritical shams?"

GREAT BRITAIN STORM SWEPT
