LETTER FROM AN ENGLISH SOLDIER

The following interesting letter from an English Tommy to his uncle and aunt here, reflects his opinion of the fighting, the Dominion troops not excepted. All points of view are in-teresting, therefore quite fit for pub-lication and our readers will no doubt enjoy it.

Driver Bellman, 136 T.F., 47th Lon Div., A.S.C. No. 1 Co., B.E.F., France.

Dear Uncle and Aunt—Just a line or more, to tell you if you don't al-ready know of poor Weedon's death. He died as far as I can understand while in the act of saving a comrade's life, who had set his bomb to explode in three seconds but alas, before he could throw it, he got a bullet through his leg, which made him fall to the ground. Weedon then, I am told, picked up this dangerous missile to throw into the German trench and so save his comrade's life. He was killed just as he was about to do so and blew the already wounded man to bits and seriously wounded my brother. It blew his mess-tin right into his stomach, which set up blood-poisoning. He was sent over to England and died in a temporary hospital at Eastbourne. They took the trench they were at-tacking and the General ordered that all their names should be mentioned in "Divisional Orders." My brother was given a military funeral, that was for his services. I got special leave to go and see him, but was too late to even see him buried, still my going home for five days comforted mother and Grandpa just as much as I could. Why? Well, the Canadians were, at Neuve-Chapelle in March, when the terrific battle raged, they put twice as many shells over in one day, to what they put over during the whole Boer war. On the battlefields of to-day there's not a blade of grass hardly allowed to grow, not a tree or shrub stands; it's absolute slaughter. That word is a good description of this war and yet in England, young men, etc., play cricket and tennis on green lawns over which a shell has never yet even passed. They ought to put a few of them out here for a day! That's enough.

You asked me to tell you something of the Canadians. Well, the more I hear about them, I hear they are a fine physical body of men, but they have very little discipline. I don't know if it is true. Yes, I saw the two Canadians with my own eyes nail-ed, head downward, to a barn door; it's quite true. The Huns will do worse things than that too. I shall be glad when it all over, for everyone's sake. Out here in France, three out of four women seem to be in mourning dress, for a lost one. Every family seems to have lost at least one. How I shall miss Weedon, when I get home. My best chum, only 19 years of age too. You can't imagine my grief. Still I shall try to be cheerful for mother's sake. We shall win in the end. We have some big guns coming up now and Kitchener's Army will come out soon. This war, I think, will end where it is now, and all of a sudden. Trusting all are in the pink of health, With affectionate love to all, Harold.
