IMPRESSIVE MEMORIAL SERVICE IN HONOR OF SAPPER WILLIAM BETTS

Wesley Methodist Church Crowded Last Night on the Occasion.

TRIBUTE PAID TO THE DECEASED

Rev. Mr. Martin Referred to Noble Way in Which Soldier Met Death.

A very large congregation was present at Wesley Methodist church last night to take part in the memorial service held in memory of late Sapper William Betts.

The pastor, Rev. D. E. Martin, B.A., selected as the text of his evening sermon, words found in John the 19th chapter and 30th verse: "It is finished." It was stated that these three words formed the greatest sentence ever uttered. They referred to something world-wide and some-thing specific.

The Earthly Life of Christ was finished. It was the worker's cry of achievement and the sufferer's cry of relief.

The intent of the Old Testament Scriptures was finished. What the law required, what the Prophets foretold, and what the Old Testament types foreshadowed, was accomplished.

The revelation of God and man was finished. In the murderers of Christ we have revealed how low humanity can go, and in Christ we once for all see how high the human can reach. The clearest vision this world has caught of God was in His out-poured love on the cross.

A redemption covering man's past, present and future, was finished. This redemption provided for the guilty, the defilement, and the power of sin. It provided the gift of the Holy Ghost and met the desire of immortality.

Proceeding the speaker referred to the contents of letters recently received from the late Sapper Betts expressing noble sentiments concerning his duty as a British soldier, and also embodying a commendable seriousness born of the new and tragic surroundings of the battle front.
