ITALIANS LAUNCHED FRESH OFFENSIVE

Desperate Fighting in Progress, Austrian Official Statement Reports ON EASTERN FRONT

Teutons Beaten in All-Day Fight; Claims of the Enemy

Vienna, Aug. 19.—The Italians have begun another big offensive against the Austrians in the Isonzo region of the Austro-Italian theatre, where fighting is in progress over a thirty-seven mile front, running from the region of Tolmino to near the head of the Adriatic Sea on the Carso plateau.

"Eastern theatre: There is nothing of importance to report. "Italian theatre: The Italians have attacked the coastal territory on the Isonzo, which has belonged to Austria for centuries past. After the strongest of artillery preparation, lasting a day and a half, which was followed yesterday afternoon by reconnoitering raids, the enemy infantry early Sunday morning attacked between Mrzivilj and the Sea.

London, Aug. 19.—There has been a considerable stiffening in the front in Rumania and also in Russia in the region of Vilna. South of Grozochi, Southern Moldavia, the Russians have made a stand against attacks of the Teutonic allies and repulsed them, and in the Slavic sector also have beaten off attempts by the invaders to take further ground in the Lake Naroc district of the Vilna front the Germans endeavored to Russian trenches, but their attack broke down under the Russian barrage fire.

A statement issued from German Army Headquarters says: "Since the beginning of our operation on July 19, in Eastern Galicia, Bukovina, and Moldavia, there have fallen into the hands of the (Teuton) Allies 625 officers, 41,300 men, 257 guns, 548 machine guns, 191 mine throwers and 50,000 rifles.

"In war material there were captured large masses of munitions, 25,000 gas masks, 14 armored cars, 15 motor lorries, 2 armed trains, 6 loaded railway trains, 26 locomotives, 218 railroad cars, several aeroplanes, a large number of vehicles and considerable supplies of provisions.

"It is especially noteworthy that during the recent fighting, munition columns, trains and railway transport, in spite of the heaviest demands, smoothly assured the work of conveyance to and from the front.

ONLY ONE LIFE LOST IN RIGUAD

Fifty-Two Explosions In Powder Plant; Village Wiped Out

LOSS TWO MILLION Tons of Metal Were Distributed Over a Mile Radius

Montreal, Aug. 19.—One man dead and six more or less seriously injured is the known human toll taken in a terrific explosion or series of fifty-two explosions Saturday morning at the powder plant of Curtis and Harvey Company, Limited, at Dragon in the village and vicinity of Rigaud, that liberally smashed and broke windows and shook houses miles away. This estimate is given by Mr. T. H. Curtis, vice-president and managing director of Curtis and Harvey Company, but there are fears that more may have been killed or injured, as it has been practically impossible to ascertain definitely the full extent of the loss owing to the condition of the destroyed buildings and the fact that the employees got as far away as possible from the scene of the disaster and have been difficult to locate. Two hundred and fifty men were in the plant when the first explosions occurred. The dead man was Gordon Shortrede, an English, an expert who was employed as foreman, at the plant.

The monetary loss is placed at \$2,000,000 by Vice-President Curtis, who was almost wiped out by fire, and it was an accident, pure and simple, according to Mr. Curtis, due to a chemical reaction in the faking section of the plant, and was not due to neglect or any defect. "The thing which happened," he said, "might happen in any plant at any time."

In view of the fact that the village of Dragon in the vicinity of the plant, was almost wiped out by fire, and that tons of metal were distributed around the country for nearly a mile, the ground being dotted with twisted fragments of iron pipe, boiler plate etc., a portion of the boiler weighing over a ton flying half a mile away, it is marvelous that there was not a heavy loss of life. The first explosion occurred at 8:50. There will be an inquest.
