## THIRD SESSION OF FIRST LEGISLATURE

### The Administrator Reads Speech From the Throne—Address in Reply Moved by Messrs. Bole and Garry.

The third session of the first legis-lative assembly of Saskatchewan was opened last Thursday afternoon, in the absence of Lieutenant Governor Forster, by the administrator for Saskatchewan, Chief Justice Wet-more. There was a large attendance of visitors and the inadequacy of the old assembly buildings was amply proved. Every bit of space was filled with guests leaving scarcely room for the members to stand on the floor of the House. The supreme court judges in their true that the weather conditions in the past season affected the crop production in certain areas, it is a matter of much concern that our province has come through this year with credit. Our financial standing is unimpaired; our farmers are enter-ing upon the new season with hope; and our prospects generally were never brighter than they are at the present time. Owing to the scarcity of seed grain of sufficiently good quality in certain portions of the province and the difficulty which our farmers were likely to experience in securing good seed my government thought it advisable to take steps to deal with the matter. All documents relating thereto will be laid before you for your con-sideration. Since your last meeting a very im-portant measure affecting the rela-tions of the province with the Dom-inion has been passed by the Imper-ial Parliament. The measure grew out of the proceedings of the inter-provincial conference held at Ottawa in 1906 at which representatives of my government were present. You will, I am sure be glad to learn that as a result of the measures referred to the annual subsidies paid to the province by the Government of Cana-da have already been materially in-creased and that provision is made for further large increases as the population of the province continues to grow. You will have noted with pleasure that steps are being taken through-out the Dominion to nationalise the historic Plains of Abraham and to celebrate the three hundredth birth-day of Canada in a manner worthy of our country and of the empire. My government is enquiring into the question of the inauguration of a telephone system for the province, owned and controlled by the people through their government, have been complied with, and measures dealing with the subject will be submitted to you. The question of the establishment and organisation of a provincial uni-versity has been receiving the atten-tion of my government, and I am happy to be able to inform you that with the exception of the selection of president, the various governing bod-ies have been elected, or appointed, and that the active work connected with the organisation of this impor-tant institution may now be proceed-ed with. The necessary preliminary steps having been taken by the Federal government, the Supreme Court of the Northwest Territories was dis-solved during the past year and the Provincial Courts provided for by

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE The speech from the throne which the administrator read was as fol-lows: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: Among the duties which have de-veloped upon me during my adminis-tration of the affairs of this province owing to the absence of the Lieuten-ant Governor, none has afforded me today, when I am called upon to welcome you to the Third Session of the First Legislative Assembly. It is very gratifying to be able to congratulate you upon the conditions prevailing throughout Saskatchewan and upon the bright prospects for the continued growth and develop-ment of the province.
