

The fate of some recent applications for municipal bousses in different parts of the country would seem to indicate that public sentiment is against the principle. The feeling appears to be that a business that is doing well does not require a bonus, and one that is going down hill cannot be pushed up by a civic grant. Several by-laws, providing for the municipal aiding of local industries, have been rejected in as many places. And in view of what has happened in Brockville and elsewhere the experience is justified.
