Toronto, March 21.—Except that nogs were 4-8c better there was practically no change in the condition of trade at the western cattle markets

The receipts were a total of 57 loads, including 1,500 hogs, 200 sheep and lambs, and about the usual small run of milkers and calves.

Export cattle is no better; if anything rather weaker; the range is from \$4.50 to \$4.65, and the best price for a few choice selections was \$4.80

Butcher cattle was practically unchanged; good stuff sold at from 33-4 to 41-4c per lb.; the proportion of good quality was fair, and we had a pretty satisfactory clearance, but inferior and common cattle was available and an unquotable quantity.

Export bulls, feeders and milch cows were unchanged.

In small stuff, while prices were nominally unchanged there was a decided weakness, trade was dull, and it was claimed that except for the best grades there was practically a de-cline of from 15 to 25st per cwt. in both sheep and lambs. Good calves will sell.

Our Mackenzie, Bowell Again Pro poses its Six Months! Hoist.

Ottawa, March 22—In the Senate yesterday in moving the second reading of the bill, Senator Mills dwelt at length upon what he termed the iniquial length upon what he termed the iniquity of the gerrymander of 1882—a wrong against the Liberal party that had been perpetuated by the redistribution bills of 1891 and 1892. The argument that Mowat had gerrymandered Optagio was no instification for the ered Ontario was no justification for the course of the Federal Parliament. He denied the correctness of the contention put forward last year in the Senate that redistribution could be made only after the decennial cencus. Parliament could redistribute every year, so long as proportionate representation of the provinces was not disturbed. He asked the Senate not to stand in the way of carrying out the wishes of the

people.
Sir Mackenzie Bowell said he had Sir Mackenzie Bowell said he had heard the speech so often that he knew it alross by heart. Mr. Mills im proved each time he delivered it and by the time the regular season for intribution arrived he would have it nearly letter perfect. Continuing, he pointed out the inconsistency of the Covernment in crying out for adhe pointed out the inconsistency of the Government in crying out for ad-hesion to county boucdaries, and yet in this bill departing from that prin-ciple. Again, they had denounced the redistribution of seats in Eastern On-tario; yet now they had not a change to propose in this section of the pro-vince, believing sincerely that the coa-stitution contemplated what Mr. Mills stitution contemplated what Mr. Mills said it did, believing further that it stitution contemplated what Mr. Mills said it did, believing further that it would be in the best interests of theses, people to leave their redistribution after the census, he believed the Selate would be justified in dealing with this bill in the same way as they did that of last year. The Government suggested leaving the bill in the hands of the judges. The hill said the county boundaries should be adhered to as far as possible, taking representation by population into account. He quoted Mr. Laurier in 1997, in speaking in opposition to submitting the delineation of constituencies to a court of judges; Sir John Macdonald in 1892, took the same view, being opposed to delegating the power of Parliament. Sir John tenaciously adhered to his conceptions of what was right in Government. He was not surprised at Mr. Laurier, in 1892, having spoken one way and voted another. They were used to that in the gentleman and his followers. He was firmly convinced the course taken by the Senate last year should be pursued now, and he concluded by moving the six mouths' hoist.
