London, April 8.—The Singapore correspondent of the Daily Express wires a ghastly story of cannibalism at sea brought to Singapore by two survivors of the Vovia Scotian bark Angola, wrecked six days' sail from Manila, October 23 last. The correspondent says:

"The survivors, Johannsen, a Swede, and Morticornu, a Spaniard, assert that the Angola struck a reef. Two rafts were built. The smaller, bearing five men, disappeared. The other with twelve men drifted for forty days. The sailors ate barnacles, sea weed and their boots. The twenty-
