

# WITHOUT A PARALLEL ABSOLUTE

Extent, Variety and Value of Work of Closed Legislature.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, In a Long Speech From the Throne Re views the Legislation of the Second Session of the Eleventh Legislature of Ontario-Measures Passed During a Busy Session of the House.

Toronto, May 15.—Ceremonies, brief and meagrely attended, but not a whit the less dignified on that account, brought to a conclusion the second ses-sion of the Eleventh Legislature of the province, when Lieutenant-Governor Mortimer Clark formally dismissed the members of the Local Assembly yester day morning. His Honor arrived at the Parliament Buildings at a few min-utes before 11 o'clock, and, accompan-ied by his aide-de-camp and a traveling escort of twelve mounted troopers drawn from the Royal Canadian Dra-goons. His coming was signalized by the strains of the National Anthem and the general salute from the waiting guard of honor of 100 men of the Royal Grenadiers.

Within the chamber, the scriptural two or three were gathered together, Hon. Messrs. Foy, Pyne, Monteith, Cochrane and Beck were at their desks, together with twelve of the Government members. The work undertaken and ac-complished is of such extent, variety and value as to make the session now

closing without a parallel in the history of this province in that respect.

It is with much gratification I observe that the Legislature has joined with the Parliament of Canada in extending an invitation to Their Majesties

He King and Ones to right this countries. the King and Queen to visit this coun try, and I need hardly remark that the people as a whole enthusiastically second the efforts of their representa-tive bodies in extending this invitation.

We have been favored since the opening of the session by a visit from His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, who, as a rephew of our gracious King, has been received with every evidence of loyalty and devotion to the Crown by the people of On-tario, and who, in his individual capacity, made a very favorable impression on all who had the pleasure of coming in contact with him.

Aids to Agriculture.

Among the measures that it is my privilege to sanction, I am glad to no-tice there are several which have in view the interests of agriculture; the basic industry of this province. The provision by which the grants to agricultural societies will be paid in accordance with the work actually done for agriculture is calculated to have a heipful effect. The enactment of a law providing for the appointment of dairy inspectors should prove of advantage to the butter and cheese industry. The measure for the protection of bees should likewise be satisfactory to the farmers of Ontario. I notice also that you have taken steps to bring to the Agricultural College the assistance of its graduates by providing that they will cultural societies will be paid in ac-

railways, whereby the former tax is doubled, will assist the province materially in carrying on its charitable institutions and at the same time yield revenue to the municipalities.

By the enactment of the bill amending the Liquor License law more effective restrictions have been placed around the liquor traffic. It is gratifying to know that the province and the municipalities share equally in the increasing revenue that this measure will yield. The clauses of the bill tending towards the permanence and efficiency of Local Option have met with very general approval from moderate men.

Work For Education. In regard to the very important sub ject of education, two measures have been enacted. ACROBATIC DANCING.

It Was Regarded By the Ancient Greeks With Contempt.

Greeks With Contempt.

A passage in Herodotus tells us with what contempt the Greeks treated mere acrobatic dancing and how inferior it was considered to be to the higher art. A certain Hippocleides, having been asked to show one of the many accomplishments which entitled him to become the husband of the daughter of the tyrant of Sicyon, proceeded to display himself in the dance, and having commenced with a stately measure he then wished to show his wonderful agility, and so well did he succeed that Clisthenes, the tyrant, angrily exclaimed, "Son of Tisander, you have danced away your marriage!" refusing to have a son-in-law who was so little of an artist that he could make a boast of his mere skill. Socrates, too, had great dislike to the "wonderful tricks" which dancers could perform with their bodies and thought them very ugly. What would have been his disgust could be have seen some of our modern contortions? As in all great art, the Greeks in their dancing made use of mechanical means only in so far as they could assist in carrying out the artists' inspiration. The true artist should not be so hampered by any technical difficulties. He must be an absolute master of "technique," but never should he allow that "technique" to be the end and aim of his art. By so doing he forfeits all claim to the title of artist in the real and highest sense of that much abused word.

Looking, then, at the subject from this point of view, we can see the gulf which separates modern dancing from the Greek dancing. The modern term denotes something entirely mechanical, however pretty and pleasing our dancing masters contrive to make it by having rhythmical acrobatic feats performed by beautiful executants. Dancing in the Greek sense must be interpreted quite differently. It is rhythmical movement—and so far it is mechanical—but it is also pantomimic. It is the imitation of words by gestures, the bodily expression of a feeling. Nineteenth Century.
