GOOD SOUND TALK.

The sixth congress of the Chamber of Commerce of the Empire in London, England, is now in session. Their program of business includes both national and international political and financial questions of the most far-reaching import and it is expected that much good will result from this important meeting.

One of the questions to be discussed and one in which this country is vitally interested is the preferential treatment in the markets of the motherland and her colonies on a reciprocal basis. The following resolution introduced in behalf of the Montreal Board of Trade has a ring of common sense in it:

"Whereas in the resolution of the fifth congress of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, held in Montreal in August, 1903, it was stated that the bonds of the British Empire would be materially strengthened by a mutually beneficial commercial policy, it is the opinion of this congress that it is in the interest of the component parts of the Empire that steps should be taken towards consummating such an arrangement.

"There are in the United Kingdom, her colonies and dependencies, natural resources and industries which, if developed, would be sufficient to provide the British Empire with its food supply and all other necessities and requirements of life.

"Be it therefore resolved, that this congress urges upon his majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and in the various colonies and dependencies, the granting of preferential treatment in their respective markets on a reciprocal basis, each to the other, believing that thereby the bonds of union will be strengthened, and the British Empire largely freed from dependence on foreign markets for food and other supplies."

When H. S. Clements was elected to Parliament he pledged himself to serve the interests of every man in his riding, and he has, up to the present, faithfully adhered to that promise. His plea for justice for the colored population made in the House the other day shows that he is overlooking nobody. The colored people of Chatham and vicinity are an industrious, hard working class of people and there is no reason why they should be completely ignored by the Laurier Government. They have a good friend in Mr. Clements, however, and that gentleman will do his utmost to have them placed on an equal footing with their other fellow men.

A Hamilton young woman drowned herself in the bay last Saturday. There seemed to be no explanation for the deed except that it was induced by temporary insanity, the derangement being due to the excessive use of headache powders. It is the same old story of people who will tamper with dangerous drugs without any consultation with a physician. In a country such as this, where there are so many capable physicians within easy reach, there is positively no excuse for occurrences such as above referred to. The revenue on such articles is surely very small compared with the enormous import duties that are contributed yearly, and would not seriously impair the national revenue to any appreciable extent. We all know that settlers' effects are allowed in free of duty. The presents that come from relations on birthdays and at Christmas do not compete with the home commodity, and the money expended on them

In the way of negligee nothing is more comfortable than the kimono, and its loose fitting lines make it easy of construction. The pattern is cut with a loose back and front, and the closing is in kimono off-side front style. Long flowing sleeves are pleated, but for warm days the sleeves length is more favored. A trimming band of contrasting material edges the kimono. Dimity, lawn, nainsook, crepe, China silk, and cashmere are suitable materials. The quantity of material required for misses' in the medium size is 3 1/4 yards of 27 inch goods and 7-8 yard of 27 inch goods for kimono band. Pattern No. 4144 is cut in 3 sizes, 12 to 16 years. For ladies' size, 36 requires 3 3/4 yards of 27 inch goods, and 7-8 yard of same width for trimming band, of contrasting goods. TOWNSHIP COUNCILS

CHATHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

The regular monthly meeting of the Township of Chatham council was held at the Township Hall on Tuesday, July 3. The members were all present and minutes of last meeting were read, adopted and signed. A letter was read from J. W. Flator, C. E., certifying that the concrete culvert over the Louisville Tap drain at the 2nd and 3rd concessions has been completed according to the specifications of W. G. McGeorge.

A written application and a copy of a resolution passed at a special meeting of the ratepayers of S. S. No. 7, requesting that the council pass a by-law for the purpose of authorizing the issue of debentures to borrow the sum of \$1,540.00, that being the amount required to repair the school house in the said school section.

John Howard, secretary of the Skinner Drainage Works, wrote stating that Robert Harper had again been selected the commissioner to superintend the operating of the pumping plant in connection with the Skinner Drainage Works.

A notice was received from ratepayers of the 12th lot 7, concession 12, to the effect that the said drain is out of repair and asking that a commissioner be appointed to have some repairs done under section 74 of the Drainage Act.

John Oxley wanted some grading done along the 9th and 10th concession road at lot 20.

B. Booth complained that water from the Township of Sombra was flooding his land, n-14 lot 17, concession 4, Gore.

James Carroll asked for tile to place in the road ditch opposite his gate, n-12 lot 7, concession 12.

Richard Lucas was heard in reference to getting a ditch constructed across the w-12 lot 13, concession 10.

John Oxley wanted some grading done along the 9th and 10th concession road at lot 20.

B. Booth complained that water from the Township of Sombra was flooding his land, n-14 lot 17, concession 4, Gore.

James Carroll, commissioner on the Chatham and Dover town line drain, stated that there are a large number of cattle pasturing on lots 1 and 2 in the 10th concession along the said drain and tramping into the drain, causing a very large amount of the earth along the bank to fall in and doing the drain a great deal of injury.

A. Conliffe asked that the road ditch along the Lindsay side road in the 5th concession be completed.

Aaron Coulter complained that the roadway at lots 22 and 23 between the 4th and 5th concessions is in a bad condition for the want of proper drainage.

Moved by Harper and Brown, that as the board of trustees of S. S. No. 7 has made application for the issue of debentures to borrow \$1,540.00, the clerk is hereby instructed to prepare a by-law for such purpose to be read and finally passed at next meeting of this council.—Carried.

Moved by Brown and Wickers, that as a notice has been received that the Keiver drain is out of repair, Councillor Harper is hereby appointed commissioner to let and superintend the work of repairing the said drain as asked for.—Carried.

Moved by Brown and Harper, that Councillor Wickers with the commissioner investigate the injury that has been done to the Chatham and Dover town line drain by cattle tramping therein and do in the matter what they think proper.—Carried.

Moved by Wickers and Irwin, that Councillor Harper consult John S. Fraser, the township's solicitor, in reference to opening up the 10th and 11th side road in the 3rd concession and report at next meeting.—Carried.

Moved by Harper and Wickers, that the request of A. Conliffe, in reference to the Lindsay side road, be referred to Councillor Brown, with power.—Carried.

Moved by Wickers and Irwin, that the Com'r of Div. No. 3 make an investigation on the reported bad condition of the 4th and 5th concessions roadway, with power.—Carried.

Moved by Wickers and Harper, that as requested, Councillor Brown assist the Com'r on the Paddy drain and deciding the amount of repair required.—Carried.

Moved by Brown and Harper, that the Clerk notify F. W. Flator, C. E., that he is appointed and instructed to as soon as possible make a survey and examination, and report with a view to the repair of the Stephens drain in the township of Chatham, as the survey on the repair of these drains has been delayed owing to the illness of the late W. G. McGeorge.—Carried.

Moved by Brown and Irwin, that as different ratepayers have signified their intention of applying for a loan under the tile, stone and timber drainage act, the Clerk is hereby instructed to insert in the Dresden Times, also in the Chatham Weekly Banner and Chatham Weekly Planet a notice that a special meeting will be held at the township hall on August 16th at 10 in the forenoon for the purpose of considering and passing a by-law establishing a credit with the
