The following resolution introduced in behalf of the Montreal Board of Trade has a ring of common sense in it:

Whereas in the resolution of the fifth congress of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, held in Montreal in August, 1903, it was stated that the bonds of the British Empire would be materially strengthened by a mutually beneficial commercial policy, it is the opinion of this congress that it is in the interest of the component parts of the Empire that steps should be taken towards consummating such an arrangement.
