VISIT OF PRINCE LOUIS

Opens Canada's National Exhi-
bition Tuesday, Aug. 29.

Will Be in Toronto For a Week, the
Guest, Except on 28th and 29th, of
Lady Kirkpatrick—Civic Reception
and Banquet Arranged For—Mont-
real Entertains the Prince and 300
of His Bluejackets.

Toronto, Aug. 23.—The Mayor yes-
terday received a telegram from His
Highness Prince Louis of Battenberg,
in accordance with a long standing en-
gagement, will be in Toronto from Aug-
ust 26th to the 31st as the guest of
Lady Kirkpatrick. He adds that the
prince will be disengaged on 28th and
29th only and will be disengaged for
a dinner on August 29th, and will be
delighted to see the Mayor and the
citizens of Toronto on the 28th and
29th. On receipt of this message the
Board of Control yesterday decided on
the following program, subject to change:

Monday, Aug. 28.—11 a.m., civic re-
ception. At 1 p.m., luncheon at R. C.
Y. C. on the island. At 3 p.m., garden
party at the R. C. Y. C. on island.
Evening dinner at Government House.
Tuesday, Aug. 29.—Luncheon at noon
at the Exhibition as the guest of the
Exhibition directors. Afternoon, open-
ing Exhibition and in the evening din-
ner at the Exhibition grounds as guest
of the city.

LITTLE CEREMONY AT MONTREAL

Prince Louis and the Bluejackets, and
Their Reception.

Montreal, Aug. 23.—Prince Louis, of
Battenberg, accompanied by his staff
arrived at Place Vigor Station early
yesterday morning from Quebec,
where his second cruiser squadron is
lying and was met by a civic and
military deputation, but there was no
guard of honor and very little cere-
mony. The party entered carriages
and went to the Windsor, where his
Serene Highness will be the guest of
the city during his stay. At 11 o'clock
the civic welcome to the Prince was
extended at the City Hall, when an
address was read by Acting Mayor
Cloutier. In the absence of Mayor La-
pierre. Later in the day he drove out
to the Forest and Stream Club, where
he was entertained at luncheon. Last
evening he was dined by the officers
of the Montreal Militia. Corps and
attended the naval tournament at
the Arena.

300 Sailors Parade.

Three hundred sailors, under com-
mand of ten officers of the second
cruiser squadron, commanded by Rear
Admiral Prince Louis of Battenberg,
lying at Quebec, arrived here yester-
day morning and departed at West-
mont station of the C. P. R., and
from thence paraded to the Arena,
where they will camp during their two
days' stay. They will take part in
a naval tournament in aid of the city
hospitals, and will be liberally enter-
tained by the city and private corpora-
tions during their stay. In the after-
noon the men were taken for an elec-
tric car ride to Lachine, after going
around the city, and then boarded a
steamer and made the run down the
Lachine rapids.

Wanted at Windsor.

Windsor, Aug. 23.—An effort is being
made to have Prince Henry of Bat-
tenberg visit this city, and, unavail-
ing, the fountain being constructed in memory
of the Essex volunteers who lost their
lives in the South African war.

CHANGES IN THE INTERCOLONIAL

One Position Abolished and a Thousand
Dollars a Month Saved.

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—Hon. Mr. Emmen-
son, Minister of Railways, has announ-
ced that among the changes to be made
in the management of the Intercolonial
Railway, the office of chief superin-
tendent, held by the late J. E. Price
of Montreal, will be abolished on the
recommendation of the Deputy Minister
and general manager, who advises that
by this step about a thousand dollars
a month will be saved in salaries, with-
out in any way impairing the efficiency
of the operation of the line.

It has been decided to place the track
and maintenance of the way depart-
ments under the charge of T. C. Bur-
pee, C. E., and all the other leading of-
ficials whose responsibilities are in-
creased will be held accountable for
the results in their respective spheres.

Horse Plunged Over Children.

Cornwall, Ont., Aug. 23.—While the
street parade of Morris & Rowe's circus
was passing up Pitts street yesterday
a horse took fright and ran away,
plunging through a great crowd of
people. None of their injuries are fa-
tal. Archie Cameron, a boy, was out
on the head and leg; George Eastman
had his head cut; J. Vallance had an
arm broken; Edith Phillips, Ida Ralphy,
two little girls named Carter, Wilfred
Fetterly and two other children were
cut and bruised. A cowboy, who was
one of the marshals of the parade, fol-
lowed the runaway and lassoed the
horse.

A Mid-Day Drowning.

Toronto, Aug. 23.—Frank Carroll, 16
years old, who lived at 229 Davenport
road, was drowned while bathing off
the dock at Harbor Square at 12:30
o'clock yesterday. Carroll, who was
employed as a clerk with the Copp-
Clark Co. went for a swim with some
of his fellow-employees during the noon
hour. He swam out about fifteen feet
towards a sail boat, and sank. His
absence was not noticed for some time,
and when he was missed several of his
companions dived unsuccessfully for him.
Mate Ackroyd recovered the body an
hour later. His father is employed in
the Crown Lands Department.

FRANCE THREATENS SULTAN.

Demands Indemnity For Arrest of Al-
gerian Subject in Morocco.

Tangier, Aug. 23.—The French Min-
ister, St. Rene Taillandier, has pre-
sented to the Sultan, Mulai Abd-Bi-
Assis, an energetic demand for an in-
demnity of \$2,000 for the recent arrest
of the official responsible for the arrest,
and an additional indemnity of \$100
daily until the prisoner is released.
It is believed that the Sultan will
probably grant the demands of the

Minister, as it is definitely known that
the French Government is determined
to adopt forcible means to bring the
Sultan to terms should satisfaction not
be immediately given, including, if ne-
cessary, the occupation of a Moroccan port.

This incident is independent of the
Franco-German controversy regarding
the proposed international conference.
Indeed, it is known that Germany ap-
proves the course of France in re-
sponding to the unwarranted arrest of one
of her citizens, and the German Gov-
ernment has given official notification
of its intention to support the action
of the French Government.

Moroccan officials recently arrest-
ed the chief of the Algerian settlement
at Gharb because of local troubles. The
demand of the French Minister for the
release of the Algerian was refused,
the Sultan claiming that all Mus-
lim territory came under his juris-
diction as Caliph of Islam.

YOUTH FORGED CHEQUE, \$1,860.

Cashed It, Too, After Risky Prelimin-
aries, But Is Soon Detected.

Cayuga, Aug. 23.—One of the coolest
attempts at crime was perpetrated
here on Monday. Frank Thornton, a
boy 18 years of age, who was born in
Dundas, was on a visit to friends
here. His grandfather has a bank ac-
count in the Bank of Commerce.

Young Thornton went to the bank
with a cheque for \$1,860, having for-
ged the signature of his grandfather,
R. S. Thornton. They refused to mark
the cheque without the bank book, and
he went back to his grandfather's, and
by some means obtained the bank book,
came to the bank, got the cheque mark-
ed and cashed. This was at 3 o'clock.
He stayed in town till 7:15 when he
took the train west. The mistake was
not discovered till between 7 and 8
o'clock, when the bank officials sus-
picion was aroused.

The boy left the train at Simcoe,
walked two miles in the country, paid
a farmer \$5 to drive him to Waterloo
Station, a distance of about five miles.
He was then arrested. He had spent
\$14.

DOUBLE RUNAWAY FATALITY.

Farmer and Wife Thrown From Their
Rig and Killed.

Hamilton, Aug. 23.—Amos Clough
and Mrs. Clough of Abingdon, Caistor
Township, were killed in a runaway
Monday night. The started early to
drive to David Bell's, a nephew's place.
A few hours later a man named Dal-
rymple found the old woman uncon-
scious by the roadside. She died while
he was gone for assistance. Dr. Mc-
Lellan, who was sent for, found the
body of Mr. Clough. The horse was
found near the Clough farm with
pieces of the rig, which had been
wrecked.

DEATH ON THE TRACK.

Young Woman Instantly Killed by Ex-
press Train Near Lancaster.

Lancaster, Aug. 23.—No. 2 fast ex-
press, passing Lancaster at 5 o'clock
yesterday morning, struck and killed a
young woman named Margaret Du-
fresne, daughter of Chas. K. Dufresne.
She was walking on the track on her
way to her duties as a domestic in the
residence of a gentleman living about
a mile and a half east of this place.
When about a mile on her way the
train overtook her, striking her and
throwing her off the track. Death
must have been instantaneous.

Grand Trunk Asks Protection.

Toronto, Aug. 23.—The Grand Trunk
Railway has instituted legal proceed-
ings against the striking machinists at
Stratford. This morning application
was made at Osgoode Hall for an in-
junction to restrain Gilbert Johnson,
Robert Stamp, Enoch Brown, Christo-
pher Wilson, Samuel Hamilton and
several others from interfering with the
men they have employer to work in
the shops.

14-Year-Old Boy a Hero.

Walkerville, Aug. 23.—While playing
on the dock, Eleanor Pinnit, seven
years of age, fell into the river. There
were a number of people on the dock at
the time, but no one made any attempt
to rescue her until Arthur Kerr, four-
teen years old, jumped in the river and
brought her out safely.

Cars Collide on Brooklyn Bridge.

New York, Aug. 23.—One man was
killed and five persons injured in a
trolley car collision on the Brooklyn
Bridge yesterday. Two surface cars,
driving under the same stone arch on
the Brooklyn side of the bridge met in
a rear-end collision.
