Editorial Notes.

At the approaching session of the Municipal Council we hope to see some action taken with regard to the introduction into use of broad tires in this county.

The letter of Mayor Thomson which appeared in the ACADIAN some weeks ago and was copied into other papers in this and neighboring counties, has created quite an excitement in some circles.

Town Council Meeting.

The monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening and was a lengthy and interesting session.

The following accounts were ordered paid: J. W. Yangbu \$ 32, Geo. Lynch 1.07, Capt. Eagles 1.97, Wm. McNut 3.00, Blackadder Bros. 3.00, Town Clerk 2.50, T. W. Ouseley 2.80, Valley Telephone Co. 2.90, Acadia Edison Electric Co. 41.48, Prof. F. Wortman 3.00.

It was decided that the clerk have a telephone put in the house of the superintendent of streets at \$10 per year. A petition was read from members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union stating that the Minor's Protection Act is openly violated in the town and asking that the Council take such steps as will lead to its enforcement.

A letter was read from the Provincial Secretary in response to a letter from the Council stating that he would be pleased to read the Provincial Engineer, Dr. M. Murphy, at his convenience, to examine and report on the streets of Wolfville without cost.

A petition was read from a large number of citizens asking that Orchard Avenue be extended to Provost Avenue. It was resolved that C. W. Porter and Borden be a committee to investigate the matter fully and report at the next meeting of Council.

A petition was read from citizens living in the vicinity of Cherry Avenue asking that the street be widened to forty feet, and offering five feet of land on the west side and a like amount on the east side as far south as property of Mrs. Moore. It was decided that the funds at the disposal of the Council are not sufficient to provide for expenditure in this regard at present.

Resolved that plan of Patricuin street submitted by Street Committee be accepted and the clerk instructed to notify Mr. Stone of the amount of land required by the town for purposes of the street, and inquire what price he will take for said land.

Resolved that the Acadia Edison Electric Light Co. be requested to put five lights in town hall in each room as desired, at a cost of \$1.50 per light for wiring and \$6.00 per year for light.

Resolved that the clerk call a public meeting of the ratepayers of the town of Wolfville to consider resolution of the Municipal Council relative to the county buildings, said meeting to be held on the 25th day of April at 8 o'clock p. m. in Chambers' Hall.
