In the early part of last October the Herald"of this town made somes erious charges against the Postmaster of Guelph. and against the management of It even went the length to say that "the part taken by some Government employees during the late contest will leave no alternative to the new Government, and in order to make an example and show that the public servants must be neutral, they must be dismissed." It went on to charge Mr. Stirton with all sorts of political offences, and then coming down to particulars it blamed him with leaving the management of the office to the deputy postmaster Mr. Flaws, " who is totally unfit for the position, not merely on account of only a partial acquaintance with the duties, but also from his discourtesy and the uncivil manner in which he has behaved to some of the public. There are several public griev-ances which must be attended to. It is a notorious fact that letters have been unually delayed in the office, that considerable carelessness is observable in For Christmas. the general management, and that the sive postage accounts rendered have caused almost general dissatsfaction. It is of no use saying that the delay of letters has been unavoidable and that an improvement has taken place in the ELECTRO-PLATED GOODS, management, because such is not the case. And in regard to the postage ac counts, it is almost certain that a grab game is being played."

These charges first appeared on the 7th of October, and two days after they were reiterated with the promise that in a few days, "the 'Herald' will publish such evidence as will leave no doubt on this point. The 'Herald's' charges against Mr. Flaws' management of the post office are, several cases of incivility, andue delay of letters, general careless ness, and excessive charging in postage In the defence, reference is only made to the latter of these, and it is admitted that there has been trouble as to one account. So that there may be no mistake about the matter, the 'Herald' now repeats each of these charges, it re-asserts that at least one member of its staff, as well as other per sons, have been uncivilly treated by Mr. Flaws on going to the post office to transact business; that letters to and from this office, as well as from tother places, have been unduly detained, and that gross over charges have been made in postage accounts. So outrageous have these charges become that one firm has flatly refused to pay its account, a public institution has cancelled its account, and flatly refused to pay its account, a public finds that it is saving largely by purchasing stamps, and a professional man has also closed his account. Now the 'Herald' is prepared to give these names if necessary, but it does not want to do so, simply because it has no desire to drag the names of private individuals into a discussion of this nature. 
