Ward visited Toronto on the 15th, and three days later, Sir Caswell died at Quebec. James B. Rogers, Toronto's new postmaster, was given a dinner on the 28th and on the 29th. Rogers, who was killed and several injured in a fire which destroyed the Queen's Hotel at Tillsonburg.

Chevalier M. F. Glanville, former Italian Consul at Toronto, died on May 28th, and on the 30th a thousand people were killed in the interior of China by fire and typhoon. General Sir Redvers Buller died on June 2nd, and snow fell in New Brunswick.

Sir Robert Beld died in Montreal on the 3rd and on the 5th Major Dwyer was shot and wounded, a day later he died at Constantinople on August 23, and on the 24th the war lord which threatened Holland and Belgium died.

On June 8th Sir James Whitney's government was returned to power by the electors of Ontario by a overwhelming majority. The Quebec elections were held on the same day, and the Liberal Government was sustained.

King Edward visited the Kaiser at Reval on June 10th, and next day, the King of Italy was discovered by a London newspaper.

Blind Tom, the famous pianist died on June 13th, and next day the Earl of Derby died in London.

The 15th was a red letter day. The circus arrived.

On the 16th Archbishop McEwen arrived in Toronto, and was installed with due ceremony next day.

Taft was nominated in Chicago on the 18th, and on the 20th the town of Park Falls was heavily damaged by fire.

Ten thousand women paraded in Hyde Park on June 21, and on the day Harry Collins died in Toronto. A million dollar fire occurred in Three Rivers on June 22, and a race was commenced in Texas. A son was born to King Alfonso in Queen Victoria.

The break in the Cornwall train occurred on June 23rd, and on the 24th over a million and a half in arrears was paid on the altar of St. Paul's London, at the Pan-Anglican Conference.

Sir William Whitway, ex-Governor of Newfoundland, and Governor Cleveland, ex-President of the United States, died on June 24th and on the 27th bomb outrages occurred in Boston. Walter Rigg died in Toronto on June 28th.

Five thousand policemen had a hard tussle with the Suffragettes in London on the last day of June who women besieged the House of Commons.

On the same day three hundred British warships were mobilized for maneuvers. Three hundred men perished in the Rikovsky mine in Russia on the 1st of July, and on the 2nd seven arrests were made in Calcutta in connection with the bomb outrages.

Joe Chandler Harris, "Uncle Remus," died in Atlantic City on July 3, and on the next day a number of religious fanatics arrived at Pierson, Man.

In celebrating the 4th and July seven people were killed and 2,624 injured in the United States. Four hundred buildings were burned by revolutionists in Hayti, on the 5th, and on the 6th a typhoon struck Montreal and caused heavy damage. The Scott-Beresford incident happened on July 7th.

Boston was visited by a disastrous fire on July 8th, when five million dollars worth of damage was caused on the docks.

Scores of people were killed by the collapse of a building in St. Petersburg on the 9th, and on the 10th the Cornwall train was derailed after having been repaired. Bryan was nominated on that day as the Democratic candidate.

A plot to kill the Czar of Russia was discovered in Poland on July 14 and a hundred arrests were made.

On July 15th the Rev. Canon Baldwin died in Toronto, and on the 16th Field Marshall Lord Roberts landed at Quebec to take part in the Tercentenary celebration.

Seven prisoners escaped from Toronto Jail on the 17th and on the 18th the House of Commons and Senate prorogued, after the longest session on record.

General Rojstvensky was reported dead on the 19th, and the news was sent all over the world. He was dead but it wasn't the famous Rojstvensky.

The Quebec Tercentenary opened on the 20th.

Bishop Potter, of New York, died on July 21, and the Rev. J. H. Starr died in Toronto on the following day. On the same day the Prince of Wales and Vice-President Fairbank of the United States arrived at Quebec.

Haymer, of New York, won the Olympic Marathon on July 24, and on the 25th the Sultan granted a constitution to Turkey.

Wheat cutting commenced in the Canadian West on the 27th. Typhoon in Hong Kong.

Sands were drowned that day in a typhoon in Hong Kong.

The Prince of Wales left Canada on July 29, and on the 30th a train was derailed in Paris.

Er Francis C. Verburn, the oldest doctor in Ontario died that day in Toronto.

On the last day of the month Jean Louis Bell, the 11th survivor of the famous rebel leader, died in Winnipeg.

The town of Fernie, British Columbia, was completely obliterated by a fire on August 1, and on the 2nd the Prince of Wales arrived in England.

The G. P. E. train was derailed on strike on the 3rd, and that day the Zeppelin alighted twelve miles, but was destroyed by fire two days later. On the 5th an attempt was made to stab the Sultan of Turkey. The steamer Premier was burned on Lake Winnipeg, on August 7th.

Eight passengers were burned to death.

Hon. Thomas Greenway died in Winnipeg on the last day of October.

The Newfoundland elections were held on the last day of November, and after several days waiting, it was learned that each side had secured eighteen seats. Bert Havelock, the famous minstrel, died in San Francisco.

Taft and Sherman were elected President and Vice-President of the United States on November 8, and Governor Hughes was re-elected. On the 4th the town of Pembroke was devastated by fire. Charles Morse and Alfred Curtis were sent to prison for falsifying books in New York on the 6th, on which day the Sheffield choir made its first appearance in Toronto.
