NEW ARRIVALS IN THIS DISTRICT

Families of English Settlers Arriving Weekly to Take up Farms Under the Soldier Settlement Board. Five Families Arrived Already—More to Come.

On Monday T. C. Brantford, an English War Veteran arrived in Hartland having been assigned to a farm near Waterville. This arrival makes the fifth so far this season and there are 15 altogether expected for this district. These "new settlers" are all British War Veterans and are coming out to this country under the Soldier's Settlement Board.

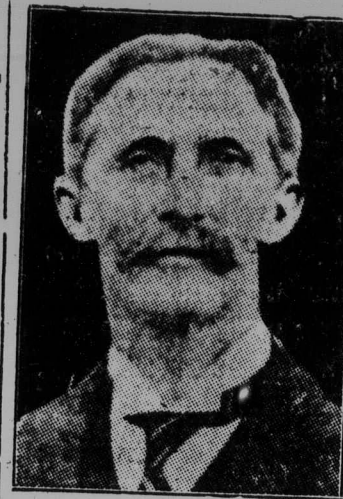
Mr. Brantford has quite a war record, having won his commission on the field and was a prisoner of war for two years. After the war he was attached to a regiment in India and after the strength of the army was reduced he returned to England, since his discharge from the army he has been a teacher in one of the schools in England and is altogether a most capable man.

It is hoped that with the exodus to Detroit making such terrible inroads into the ranks of the farmers of this vicinity that the people who are left and the ones that come to us from foreign countries will enjoy a great measure of prosperity during the coming season. The ones that are leaving daily for Detroit may find that things are not as they are pictured by the ones already there.

Many are the glowing reports that come from the United States and it certainly is strange how the men that go from Canada are always able to find work when there are so many in the States already that are of native birth that cannot find work and are classed as unemployed. There is bound to be a snap-back and when it comes there are a great number of the Canadians already in the States that are going to be without employment. The Observer wishes all the strangers that come to our district to work the farms the very best of luck and we trust that they will be welcomed with open hands by their neighbors. It is up to the people that are here to see that the ones coming across the water receive the best we can give them. They mean to work and it is up to the farmers who are here to give them every assistance that they can. We need them and they need us, so there can be no better motto than that of "Co-operation." New Brunswick needs settlers and we are getting a good class of people. Then it is up to us as citizens of this Province by the Sea to see that these settlers that come to us are treated in the right manner.

HARTLAND TOWN COUNCIL MEETS

Meeting Held Monday Night to Settle Unfinished Business of Previous Meetings—Discussion on Tenders for Town Positions—Laid Over Till Next Week.

The regular monthly meeting of Hartland Town Council was held on Monday evening in the town hall. Mayor Boyer in the chair. Councilors H. R. Nixon, H. H. Hatfield, C. W. McQuarrie, Warren White, A. Y. Dickinson, W. B. Nixon were present. The clerk read the minutes of last regular meeting and the several special meetings that intervened and all were approved with one addition.

The reports of the various Town Officials were then heard and the Treasurer, Town Marshall and Chairmen of standing committees made their reports. Reports accepted. The various departmental reports were read and ordered paid by the Clerk subject to O. K. of Chairmen of various committees concerned.

The Clerk then read letters from Mr. Tompkins and Frank Clark re assessment. Moved and seconded that Mr. Tompkins be refunded amount asked and that the request of Mr. Clark be held until it had gone through the regular procedure.

The next item on the programme was consideration of tenders for various town positions. After considerable discussion it was moved by H. H. Hatfield that the Council hold a special meeting on Monday the 13th, to discuss the various tenders. Carried.

Alderman Warren White of the Finance Committee made a report in which he spoke of borrowing \$15,000 from a gentleman in town who had money to lend the town at the rate of 5 1/2 p. c. interest until the new bonds were ready. The gentleman who made the loan to have the first choice of the new bonds. Moved by Alderman White that the Mayor and Town Treasurer negotiate a loan of \$15,000 with this party at the rate of 5 1/2 p. c. to mature on June 31st. The money thus borrowed to be placed in the bank to reduce overdraft, and later to be replaced by a new bond of the town, the choice of bonds to rest with the person lending the money. Carried.

Committee appointed to call for tenders for roofing the reservoir. Council then adjourned.

WOODSTOCK AUTHOR HAS BOOK PUBLISHED BY BRITISH FIRM

Dr. G. Fred Clarke of Woodstock, who had already made quite a name for himself in the literary world, has just received word from London that his latest book, "The Magic Road" will be bought by Mills and Boone, one of the biggest book publishing houses in Great Britain, during the present year. This well known firm buys the book as the best book of the year by a new author.

Dr. Clarke is no Detroit devotee, the scene of the book is laid along the St. John River, the sentiment is thoroughly and even aggressively Canadian, and, for the sake of our reputation, it is to be hoped that the book will be bought by New Brunswick readers, at least as willingly as they purchase the works of American authors with the scenes laid in the United States and the eagle screaming on the fourth of July on every third page.

Dr. Clarke has served a long and arduous literary apprenticeship and he richly deserves the remarkable success which he has attained.
