OLD-AGE ANNUITIES BILL Will be Introduced by Dominion Government This Session. of St. Andrew's Church will give a

OTTAWA, Friday- The bill which the Government will introduce this session in regard to old age annuities is about the same as that which Sin Riichard Cartwright laid before the Senate last session. The object of the bill is to encourage the opening up of savings accounts by the working class es so that they may have provision for old age-say at the age of 60.. If a man begins paying at 20 an annual con tribution of \$13 he will be entitled to \$120 a year whon he reaches 60, or if the 'payment is deferred until he reaches 65 then he can have \$200 a year. Payments will be made for annuities in the local post office, and the Government will allow inteerst thereon, compounded half yearly at either 31-2 or four per cent. The Government will undertake the business of management, and payment of annuities will be guaranteed by the whole credit of the Dominion. The annuities will not be subject to seizure for debt or any other cause and will not be trans ferable. No annuity can be taken for do not gripe or






