The Newfoundland fisheries employ 495 chips, and 5,489 boats, (1855.) The shore fashery is carried on in small boats, containing generally from two to four men, but sometimes having only one; whilst the Bank Schery is carried on in schooners and other vessels, calculated to sustain a heavy sea. In the fishing cosson, the smaller vessels frequently discharge their cargoes twice in the course of the day, at stages exceed for the purpose on the shore. Here the fish is cured; the offal being used as manare. In the larger vessels employed in the Bank fishery, the cutting up and salting are accessively done on board; but the subsequent stages of the preparation of the fish are conducted on chore.

Newfoundland exhibits the remarkable feature of a much groater value of experis than of inports. The expenditure of Government is probably shout £100,000 in Newfoundland; hence the resources of the colony may be reckoned at £200,000. The only rational mode of accounting for this is, that a portion of the produce of the fisheries belongs to pursues who only
