Finances Explained.

The editorials of the Patric and the statements of Liber. candidates regarding the financia condition of the Province are sin gularly false and misleading. I will be remembered that during the latter years of their admin istration, the Liberals changed the end of the fiscal year from December 31st to September 30th.

The Liberals went out of power on December 2nd. 1911. The financial year had been closed for two months and two days, and the report of the Provincial Aud itor had been issued. That re port showed that the liabilities of the Province were \$904,344 Our Liberal friends admit this adverse balance against the Prov ince. But in their financial calculations from that date to the present time they are most unfair. In the first place they compare the statement of liabilities of the Province shown on the 31st December 1914 with the statement in their last report on the 30th September 1911, and take no account of the period the Liberal Government remained in power after their last Public Accounts Report was published.
