THE GERRYMANDERING.

Full Text of the Bill as Just Brought Down.

On Friday, the 28th ult., the Readjustment Bill was brought down to the House of Commons, the following is the Act, so far as Ontario is concerned.

1. The House of Commons shall consist of 211 members, of whom 22 shall be elected for Ontario, 65 for Quebec, 21 for Nova Scotia, 16 for New Brunswick, 5 for Manitoba, 6 for Prince Edward Island.

2. The county of Carleton shall consist of the townships of Nepean, North Gower, Marlboro', March, Huntley and Goulbourn, and the village of Richmond.

3. The north riding of the county of Lanark shall consist of townships of Ramsay, Pakenham, Darling, Dalhousie, North Sherbrooke, Lavaat, Fitzroy, Torbolton and Lanark, the town of Almonte, and the village of Lanark.

4. The south riding of the county of Lanark shall consist of the townships of Bathurst, North Elmsley, Beckwith, South Sherbrooke, North Burgess, Drummond, and Montague, and the town of Perth, and the village of Carleton Place.

5. The north riding of Leeds and Grenville shall consist of the townships of South Elmsley, Welford, Oxford, and South Gower, and the villages of Smith's Falls, Kemptville, and Merrickville.

6. The north riding of Brockville and the township of Elizabethtown and Kitley.

9. The south riding of the county of Ontario shall consist of the townships of West Whitley, East Whitley, and Reach, the towns of Whitley and Dalawa, and the village of Port Perry.

Ly, Lount, Mackay, Laurier, Ryerson, Arnot, McMurrich, Stisted, Pringle, Gourd, Himsfortia, and Nipissing.

13. The east riding of the county of York shall consist of the township of East York, Scarborough, and Markham, and the villages of Yorkville and Markham.
