

Household Notes.

A bicycle pump will clean a sewing machine when it seems clogged with dirt and it is impossible to reach the parts with a cloth. Blow out the crevices with the pump and follow with

Serve white dry wine, such as Sauern or Rhine, with fish: after the fish until the roast, claret; with the reast, Burgundy: with sweet dishes. champagne or Tokay, and with coffee, brandy or cordials.

Oranges dressed with oil and vinegar make an excellent salad. The ranges should be cut up into small pieces and divested of as much of fresh water. their white fibre as possible. A little sugar may be used.

Instead of frying or broiling mut kid gloves with gasoline put the ton chops, try panning them in the gloves on and rub the hands in corn- oven. Just as they are ready to meal. Brainy Baby.

John Stuart Mill Was a Genius at Three Years of Age.

At three years of age John Stuart Mill began the study of Greek, with 'arithmetic as an evening relaxation.' At eight he began Latin, Euclid and Algebra and had to act as tutor to the younger children. He was stern and efficient tutor.

At twelve he began scholastic logic and political economy-the latter his main lifework.

At fourteen, while paying a long visit to Sir Samuel Bentham in southern France, he learned French as a relaxation from studying two or three hours before breakfast, five hours between breakfast and dinner and two or three in the evening. Being for the time master of his own hours and not subject to a stern father, he took lessons also in his spare hours in music, singing, dancing, fencing and riding, but never became proficient.

At sixteen Mill could speak in debate with adults with ease and freedoom. At eighteen he contributed to the Westminster Review. At twentyone he was made assistant in the India office and received a large salary for those days.

He did not marry until he was fortyfive. He himself said: "I never was a boy. It is better to let nature have
