The daughter of one of Glasgow's wealthiest merchants recently eloped with a skating rink instructor. Some time ago she went on a visit to a distinguished Ayrshire family, and first met her lover at a skating rink at Ayr, where he was employed as an instructor.

The attraction was mutual, and during the remainder of her stay she was a constant visitor at the rink. In due course she returned to her home in the west and of Glasgow, and shortly afterwards the young man secured a situation as instructor at the Victoria rink, the first skating pavilion opened in Glasgow.

At last they made up their mind to elope, and a few weeks ago, in Edinburgh, the couple, duly accompanied by two witnesses, were united in matrimony by a sheriff. On the following day they set off for London to spend their honeymoon. The father followed, and after a stormy inter-

view, the young wife returned to Glasgow with her father. The husband followed later, and the next chapter of the romance has yet to be written.

St. Patrick's Day Celebrations

BY NEWFOUNDLANDERS AT WHITE PIER.

St. Patrick's Day was celebrated with great enthusiasm by the Catholics of Newfoundland living at White Pier, it being the first anniversary of the Newfoundland Catholic Association. At nine o'clock the Society—a hundred strong—with the flag of Newfoundland in the forefront, and the officers and members in their regalia of Pink, White and Green, left their hall for the Church of the Holy Redeemer where High Mass was celebrated by the Rev. R. McInnis. After the Service had received communion the Rev. Dr. O'Reilly, the founder of the Association, who had come especially from St. John, N.B., to preach the panegyric on Ireland's Patron Saint, delivered one of the best orations that was ever heard in the Church of the Holy Redeemer. He spoke for the space of an hour. The Rev. Dr. took these words of the Gospel as his text: "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations." He said in part that the history of the Irish people showed that they had fulfilled these words of the Scripture, for to them was due the progress of Catholicity in the British Empire and the United States. He also said that the Irish people were the only nation in the world in spite of persecutions had always remained in communion with the Papal See. St. Patrick's Day was not to the people of Ireland or their descendants a dead memorial but a living one, for wherever the Irish people are to-day they are celebrating this feast with religious celebrations. Addressing himself to the members of the Newfoundland Catholic Association, he said: "Yes, oh members of the Newfoundland Catholic Association, I congratulate you on your first public appearance as an organized Newfoundland Association, and it seems to me that you too are a proof to the world that the memory of St. Patrick has even in this Twentieth Century lost none of its power to urge Catholic people on to the best and highest achievements in the cause of Christian religion. The history of Catholic Ireland is a monument not placed by man but set by the power of the living God to the memory of St. Patrick. Irish history has been one unbroken chain by which St. Patrick's apostolate has been continued from century to cen-

tury and from nation to nation and you, oh members of the N. C. A., are fulfilling a providential work in still further extending that apostolic. Members of the Newfoundland Catholic Association does it not seem right and just that you should keep St. Patrick's Day as the anniversary of your most excellent and prosperous Catholic Society? St. Patrick's Day is a feast that Catholics cherish because of its religious associations and religious inspirations."

After the service in the Church was over the Society went to the residence of the Parish Priest where three cheers were given for him. The Society also visited the Convent where cheers were given for the Rev. Sisters and Catholic education; cheers were also given for the Rev. Dr. O'Reilly and our Holy Father the Pope. In the evening the Ladies' Auxiliary of the N. C. A. gave a play in the Imperial Hall and played to a crowded house. The ladies and gentlemen who took part in the play are to be congratulated, for all of them did their parts well. Before the close of the play the Rev. Dr. O'Reilly made Mr. John Dinn a present on behalf of the N. C. A. in remembrance of being the first man to carry the Flag of Newfoundland through the streets of White Pier. It was voted by all that this St. Patrick's Day would go down to posterity in the history of White Pier.

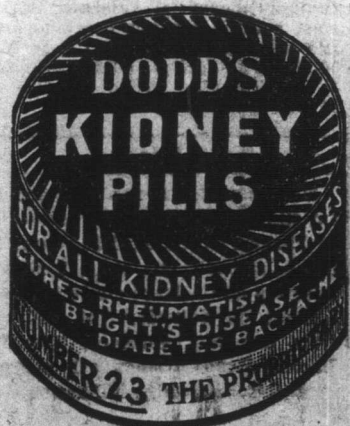
The reports of the officers were submitted and showed the Society to be in a good condition.

To His Fight Against Cerebro Spinal Meningitis.

New York, March 22.—Dr. Edward F. Ashley, a bacteriologist, died on Swinburne Island, in New York harbor, to-day, a martyr to his fight against the entry at this port of cerebro-spinal meningitis through infected Greek immigrants. Inoculated in handling the cases he contracted the disease on Sunday, and though treated with serum at the hands of the eminent Dr. Simon Flexner, the discoverer, he died of the disease which he combated yesterday.

England and Wales are experiencing a blizzard which has crippled traffic on all the systems of communication. Already it has caused hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of damage. The blizzard is accompanied by a terrific northwesterly wind storm. It is those severe in the Welsh mountain regions, where the drifts are piled many feet high. Lecture on Fr. Burke.

The lecture delivered by Rev. D. O'Callaghan at the Star Hall last night on Father Tom Burke was largely attended and proved an enjoyable and instructive treat. Mr. E. M. Jackson introduced the lecturer who for an hour had the attention of the audience while he reviewed the salient points in the life of the great Dominican. Father Burke had gained the name of a powerful preacher in the Old Country, but it was only when he crossed the ocean and was invited to preach from American pulpits that his name became famous all over the Catholic World. Froude, the historian, had a clear field for his work in attacking the Church till Father Tom not on his trail. A long controversy resulted and it was admitted by the world that Father Burke had the best of it. His fame as a lecturer resulted in his receiving invitations from all parts of America. He accepted some of the invitations and earned some half a million dollars which was distributed amongst the poor.

At the close of the lecture a vote of thanks proposed by Mr. Jackson, seconded by Mr. Graham, was carried unanimously. His Grace Archbishop Howley was present.
