War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

ON THE WESTERN FRONT.

PARIS, Feb. 20. Official despatches from the North state that the Germans have again resumed their attacks against the British forces lying near Ypres. It is believed in some quarters that this is the opening of a strong offensive movement by the Germans, who evidently hope to strike some hard blows while preventing the transfer of any more British troops from the British Isles to the coast of France, by means of their submarine blockade. An effort of the Germans to gain a position dominating the Pass of Bon Homme in the Vosges ended in failure. The Germans managed to get a foothold upon Hill No. 67, but were attacked by a company of French and put to flight. The German forces engaged in this action were reservists unused to the terrors of battle, and they fled before the rushes of the seasoned French veterans. An artillery duel is in progress near Lys Evyver, and also near Rheims. In Champagne near Perthes, Souain and Beaussere repeated attacks are being made by both sides. Every kind of operation known to warfare is in use there. Sapping and mining operations are followed by long bombardments, and infantry charges. Snipers are engaged all the time.

STEAMER TORPEDOED.

LONDON, Feb. 20. The steamship Cambank, of Cardiff, was torpedoed to-day off Amlwch Bay, Wales, by a German submarine without warning. The third engineer and two firemen of the Cambank were killed. Another member of the crew was drowned while getting into a boat.

NORWEGIAN TANK STEAMER DAMAGED.

LONDON, Feb. 21. In connection with the damaging of the Norwegian tank steamer Beiridge, by an external explosion off Folkestone, on Friday, the Admiralty announces that seven pieces of metal found aboard the Beiridge after she was beached at Walmer, have been examined at the Admiralty offices, and proved beyond a doubt to be pieces of a discharged torpedo.

AN IRISH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, Feb. 21. A small Irish coasting steamer, the Droghda, 365 tons gross, was sunk last night by a German submarine off the Gulf of Man, on an island in the Irish Sea. The Ger-

mans gave the crew five minutes to leave the ship. The crew landed last night at Dundrum.

ROUMANIA STILL NEUTRAL.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 20. The Russian Minister to Roumania, in a report to the Russian Foreign Minister, says that according to such information as he has been able to gather, Roumania will continue her present policy of armed, watchful neutrality, taking sides neither for nor against Russia and the Allies. Russia should not rely upon the co-operation of Roumania, says the Minister.

MINE SEARCHER SUNK.

BERLIN, Feb. 21. An announcement issued by the War Office, is as follows: Near Newport an enemy ship, probably a mine-searching vessel, touched a mine and sank; the enemy destroyers disappeared when shelled.

AMERICAN STEAMER MINED.

BERLIN, Feb. 21. The American steamer Evelyn, which sailed from New York on January 29th, with a cargo of cotton for Bremen, struck a mine off Borkum Island in the North Sea, yesterday. The vessel sank. The captain and 27 of the crew were saved. It has not been learned of what nationality was the mine which destroyed the Evelyn.

TWO WOMEN KILLED; FOUR CHILDREN WOUNDED.

CETTINJE, Montenegro, Feb. 20. Two women were killed and four children wounded by bombs dropped from an Austrian aeroplane, upon Cetinje to-day. The pilot of the aeroplane threw nine bombs upon the capital. It is believed he was attempting to destroy the Parliament building.

DARDANELLES FORTS BOMBARD-ED.

LONDON, Feb. 20. The British and French fleets and aviators bombarded the Dardanelles forts yesterday and to-day, says the Admiralty. The entire fleet is commanded by Vice-Admiral Sackville H. Carden. They attacked the forts at the entrance of the Dardanelles and deliberately bombarded them with all their long range guns. It was plain that great damage was inflicted. The forts on the European side were silenced. Another special says that, to-day, there are twelve battleships and twenty destroyers engaged against the Dardanelles forts.

A FRENCH SUCCESS.

PARIS, Feb. 21. The following official communication was issued by the War Office last night: In the Argonne there have been a few engagements of little importance. At Les Eparges, southeast of Verdun, after having repulsed the sixth counter attack by the enemy, we delivered a fresh attack enlarging and completing the progress realized.

on Friday. We took three machine guns, two trench mortars and two hundred prisoners, including several officers. In positions which we carried at Xon we found the bodies of soldiers belonging to five regiments.

MORE FRENCH VICTORIES.

PARIS, Feb. 21. (Official.) There has been intermittent cannonading from the sea to the Aisne with a very effective fire by our artillery. In Champagne region a counter-attack by the enemy, which was brilliantly repulsed, was followed by a vigorous pursuit, which made us masters of the whole of the German position to the north and east of the wood we captured yesterday. On the rest of the front two other counter attacks were repulsed, and we made fresh progress particularly to the north of Lomenais, where we captured two machine guns.

THE DARDANELLES BOMBARD-MENT.

LONDON, Feb. 21. The first serious attacks by the British and French Mediterranean fleet, assisted by aeroplanes and sea-planes, on the Dardanelles Forts, which commenced on Friday and continued yesterday, has met with considerable success, according to a British official report and unofficial reports received at Athens from the island of Tenedos. The Turkish official report, however, stated that no damage had been done to the forts, and that the casualties of the defenders consisted of one killed and one wounded, but that three warships were damaged by shots from the forts. The British report said that the forts were silenced on Friday evening, while none of the warships had been damaged. A Greek announcement said that the Asiatic forts were silenced, but no official report of this has been issued by the Admiralty as yet. The bombardment must have been one of the most serious ever undertaken, in the opinion of naval experts here, for no less than six battleships and armoured cruisers took part, these ships having a total of 62 12-in. and 6 10-in. guns, which out-ranged the guns of the forts. Besides desiring to bring Turkey to her knees, the allies in their attempt to force the Dardanelles aim at an early release of a large stock of wheat, which is locked up in Russian warehouses, and which the Allies wish to get out both to relieve the markets and provide Russia with the necessary credit to pay for war material bought abroad.
