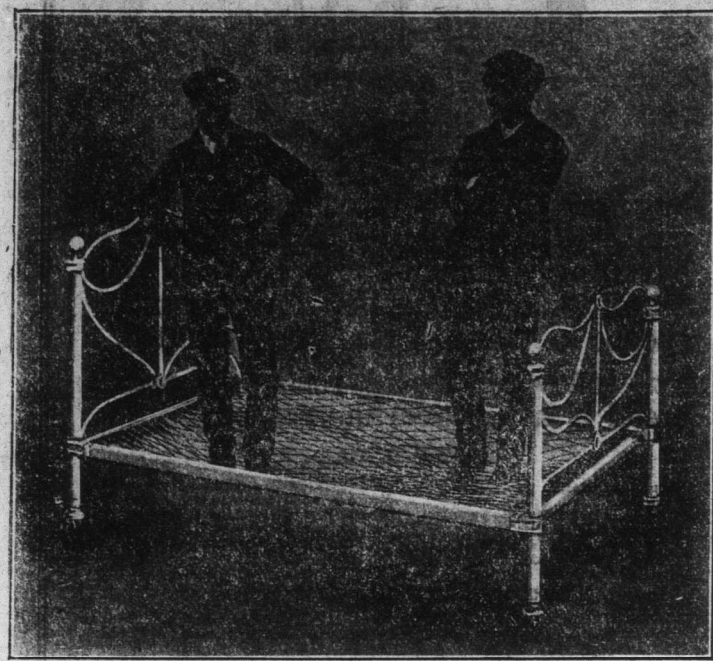

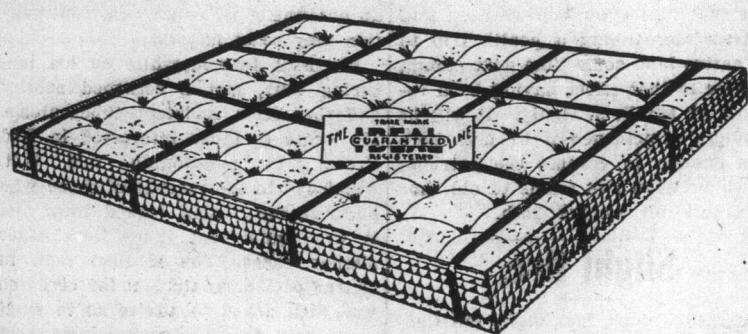

Attempted Suicide.

We learn that the Captain of the doomed liner Kristianiafjord tried to take his life thrice since the ship went ashore near Mistaken Point, but without success. On Saturday last when the storm raged and everything and everybody at the scene of the wreck had to run for shelter and the ship was pronounced to be a total wreck, he became despondent and jumped overboard and was rescued by the aid of ropes, after great difficulty. Heavy seas were running at the time and the escape from drowning was a narrow one. On two previous occasions the Captain of the big liner, who is a Norwegian naval man, it is said, attempted suicide with a loaded revolver and

by drinking a poisonous liquid, the firearm being removed from him, we hear, in the nick of time and the poison being eliminated from his system immediately and before it had time to have any great effect.

An effort is now being made to save more of the cargo as well as the fittings of the Kristianiafjord, which is now broken in two on the rocks in Trepassay Bay.

Boy Escapes Horrible Death.

BUT LOSES BOTH LEGS WHEN
STEALING TRAIN RIDE.

There now lies at the General Hospital in a critical state a 14 year old boy named Edward Hurley of Patrick Street, as the result of a terrible accident in which he narrowly escaped death while stealing a train ride at the railway station last night. It happened about 9.35 o'clock as the shore train which had landed her passengers and luggage at the station was being shunted to one of the side tracks near the Promenade by engine No. 165, driver Kelly. Young Hurley, with several other lads, stood west of the trestle ready to jump on the cars as the train backed out. The victim however in attempting to reach the platform missed his footing and fell beneath the cars. The wheels of one passed over both legs, cutting off the left one and smashing the other so badly that it will have to be amputated. Driver Kelly who always has an eye out for such happenings noticed his train to give an unusual jump and fearing something had happened put on the emergency brake and stopped the train immediately. Getting out of the cabin he hurried along the track to see what had happened when to his horror he narrowly averted tripping over the lad Hurley, who then lay unconscious in a pool of blood beneath the train. Driver Kelly realizing what had happened ordered a doctor be phoned for immediately; in the meantime, picking up the sufferer, he laid him in one of the coaches where first aid was given. Dr. Anderson was quickly on the scene and after temporarily binding the wounds had him rushed to the hospital in the ambulance which in the meantime had also reached the scene. Shortly after reaching the institution the left leg, which was broken and badly mangled, was amputated and the sufferer under the circumstances spent the night as well as could be expected, though the chances of his recovery are slight. On inquiring at the hospital this morning we were informed that the patient was then resting and that it was necessary to amputate his other leg. The unfortunate fate of the lad Hurley should be a lesson to others, who have been in the habit of joy riding at the railway station.

Will Pay All Claims.

Compensation Board Will Look After Dependents of Miners Killed at New Waterford.

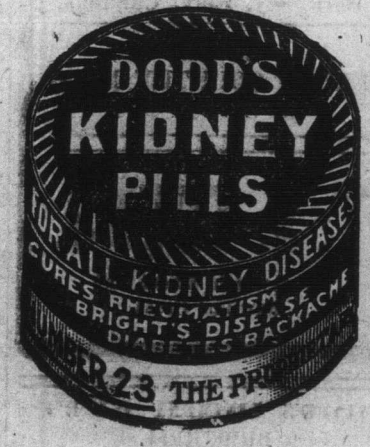
Every woman and child dependent upon the miners who lost their lives in the disaster at New Waterford, on Wednesday, will be provided for under the Nova Scotia Workmen's Compensation Act, and every man who was injured will also be paid. It is estimated that the amount of money required to look after these people will be in the vicinity of \$200,000, but officials of the Workmen's Compensation Board state that the funds belonging to the coal mining class coming under the Act will be quite sufficient for this purpose.

The total number killed was 70, and the injured nine. Of the killed some were single. Had all been married, with families, the total amount required to look after them would be about \$350,000. Under the Act the widow of every miner who loses his life at work, receives \$20 per month for life, unless she remarries, in which case she gets \$480. The children receive \$5 per month apiece, up to four children. If there are more the sum of \$20 is divided monthly between them.

In the case of single men who have been killed, the Act provides that their dependents, such as aged parents, young brothers or sisters, otherwise unprovided for, shall receive a monthly payment of 55 per cent. of their dependency, as long as that dependency lasts.

Just when the New Waterford accident occurred the question of holding a hearing of the Dominion Coal Co.'s application to "contract out" from the Act was being considered.

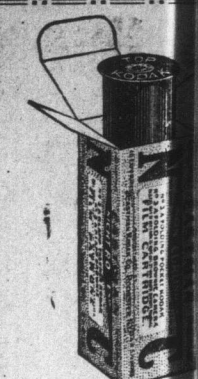
