A Flying Wing.

NEW AEROPLANE DESIGN. There is no fuselage or body to the machine. The pilot will sit in a place or less than a flying wing; has in the wing, and the motor, developing

about 12 horse power, will also be placed inside the wing, driving an air-screw which revolves just in front of the wing. Wheels underneath for landing and a tapering tail, carrying a rudder and elevators, comprise all there is external about this simplified machine.

Upon the flying craft obtained with this experimental craft it is believed that it will be possible to inaugurate a new era in "air express" design, great machines being simplified till they represent merely one enormous wing rushing through the air.
