An erroneous impression seems to prevail regarding the collection of motor taxes by the Municipal Office in St. John's. The facts are as fellows: The Council having the machinery and expert knowledge of the work, has been empowered to continue the collection of taxes since the Road Commission came inte power, as hitherto, the city retaining \$5,-500.00 of the taxes on cars and cycles and the balance is passed over to the Newfoundland Road Commission. In addition to the amount named above. the Council retains the taxes on all trucks, which at the passing of the Act was considered as operating almost, exclusively within the city lim its. If the total taxes amount to \$20,-000.00 the Council would retain \$5,-

500.00, the balance, \$14,500.00, would be spent by the Commission on outport roads. Therefore there is no cause for prejudice in this connec-In conclusion, may I ask my good friend of the Bay Roberts Guardian as well as all motorists in Conception Bay, to lend us a hand and co-

operate with us, and in doing this to get the good-will and active co-operation of the members for the various

Our aim is to eliminate politics and apply business to the improving of our road system.
