The Belfast Riots.

The Excitement Continues. The Geneva Arbitration. London, Aug. 22.—Despatches from Belfast last evening report that the condition of the city was somewhat better than it had been during the day.
The Geneva Arbitration. London, Aug. 22.—A despatch from Belfast this morning says: During the night several buildings were fired by incendiaries.
Chicago, Aug. 24.—A mixed passenger and freight train on the Chicago, Clinton and Dubuque Railroad was thrown from the track, near Pleasant Creek, this morning, by obstruction placed on the rails by some villain.

Collision on the G. W. R. at Copetown. An accident occurred on the Great Western Railway, near Copetown, on Friday morning. No. 12 express train going east should have come to a stand to allow a freight train to pass at Copetown; but, for some reason not yet investigated, the engine-driver ran past, and before he could stop the train came into collision with No. 27 freight train going west.
