—Dr. Roome, M.P., who has been suffer-

Ottawa.
—Diphtheria has broken out at 418 Ham-
ilton road west, and the house has been
placed.
—W. A. Gunn, secretary of the McClary
Manufacturing Company, returned home
Wednesday night from a business trip to
the coast.
—Harry Carling, of this city, was one of
the deputations of brewers who
attended the Government yesterday to ask a
reduction of the duty on malt.
—A. W. Guest, of this city, contributed
to the programme of the meeting of the
Veterinary Medical Society held in the
Veterinary College, Toronto, on Tuesday
evening.
—An order in council has been passed
changing the period for the close season for
speckled trout. Instead of as heretofore
extending from Sept. 15 to May 1, the close
season will in future end on April 1.
