TORONTO, ONT., June 21—11 p.m.—

west, but there is little change in Ontario

and the Eastern Provinces. Local showers

or thunderstorms have occurred in Ontario,

Quebec and in parts of the Northwest.

Huron College Alumni.

The Association of the Alumni of Huron

College held their annual meeting and

supper Monday evening, June 21, at the

Huron Hotel, under the chairmanship of

Messrs. Cook (chairman), Dewar, Allister,

Jeffery, McElhannon, Craig, Carson, Stewart

and Barron were present. One hundred

and fifty badges will be provided for

trustees, principals and teachers, and 500

invitations will be issued. The usual

buses will be hired to convey the pupils

of the kindergarten schools. An elevated

platform will be erected, and Chairman

Dewar and some other orator, as yet un-

known, will deliver addresses. The pro-

cession will form at the corner of Colborne

and King streets and march to Victoria

Park.

Duggie, and Mr. J. J. for their indefatig-

able efforts in the training of the

children and bringing the entertainment to

a successful conclusion.

Prof. Birks, organist, and Mr. Cornhill,

concertmaster. This service was an excep-

tionally fine one and reflects credit on the

entire body. Owing to the wet weather

The new pastor, Rev. Dr. Audette, will

preach at both services.
