COMMOTION AT CHICAGO.
The Prairie City Visited by a Succession of Tidal Waves.

Chicago, July 28.—A series of tidal waves along the western shore of the lake yesterday caused the water to rise over three feet above the normal water mark.

The first and highest wave was at 5:30 a.m. and from that time on until 1 o'clock there was a succession of ebbs and flows that were about an hour apart. At 10 o'clock another wave, nearly as high as the first one, appeared.

CURIOSITY FOR FLOWER LOVERS.
Eight Different Varieties of Roses Grown on One Bush.

San Francisco has an immense rose bush which looks like an enormous bouquet. At the top on one side hang clusters of pure white roses. In the middle at the top are red roses, in bloom, in profusion.

Pink and white roses hang in gay garlands at the top on the other side. All over the bush are branches of roses of other lines and colors. The delicate La France, the white Mme. Plantier, two varieties of Homer roses, the Pauline Lebeue, the Black Prince, the Castilian, and the white Lamarque lend variety and attest by their prolific blooms to the vitality of the stock, upon which they were grafted, says the San Francisco Call.

The owner of this rose bouquet is H. L. Barker, who is connected with the State Bureau of Mining. Once there were thirteen distinct varieties of roses on the bush, but the tea roses grafted on proved to be short lived, and only the hardier varieties have survived. There are enough now, eight in all, to make the bush a curiosity. Mr. Barker's explanation is that he likes to experiment with plants, and this rose bush is about 15 years old. Branch after branch has been grafted on. The original stock is the June or cabbage rose. The width at the top is not less than 25 feet, and the height equals the width. There are many stocks or canes springing from the roots. Carbon is plentifully supplied to intensify the color of the blossoms.

Hard Raps for Rhodes.
Accused of Fostering the Matabele Rebellion,

Involving Britain in Heavy Loss of Life and Treasure.

London, July 28.—The curious spectacle is afforded here of the Chartered Company, on the one hand, exaggerating the severity of the reported repulse of the English by the Matabeles in the Matopopo Hills, and of the Government, on the other hand, trying to minimize the disaster.

The reason is not hard to conjecture. Cecil Rhodes finds the storm of rebellion in the north of the colony, carefully fostered by him in order to give excuse for his absence from England during Jameson's trial, unable to be allayed as easily as he expected. Certainly, he himself is such a grotesque failure as a military leader that he has already retired to comparative safety. Bulawayo appeals for Imperial troops to finish the work of cruel subjugation of the natives, begun by him as a mere political maneuver. Chamberlain, on his part, is naturally anxious to avoid sending Imperial troops, thus making the nation pay Rhodes' bill. Hence, the anomalous state of affairs referred to above.

Sages are not wanting of an awakening of the public at large to a sense of the shame and disgrace entailed on the nation by the vanity and the government's press stock-jobbing into war likely to cost many valuable lives and millions of money.

WATCHING THE CANADIANS.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 28.—The United Trades and Labor Council of this city is after the official scalp of Immigration Inspector O'Brien, of Niagara Falls. They charge that Inspector O'Brien has failed to take any measures to exclude the daily influx of Canadians at the Falls. It was alleged that between six and seven hundred aliens cross the border every morning to work on this side, and return to their homes in Canada at night, and that many laborers row across the river in small boats in full view of the authorities. A committee was appointed to prefer charges and forward them to Washington.

DROWNED NEAR CORNWALL.
Cornwall, July 28.—On Sunday, while bathing at Farran's Point, about 15 miles west of here, Mr. Edgar Warner, of Osnaburgh Center, got into deep water, and was drowned before his comrades could rescue him. He was 18 years of age.

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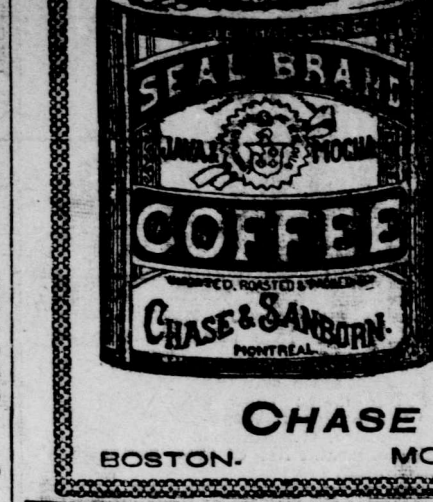
