LONDON HAD AN OFF DAY.

Smink was put in to fill the position of short, and clearly demonstrated that he was not a Pierre Ward. Only one error was registered against him, but at times he was easily "tripped." He dropped the ball thrown to him in the lucky seventh, and gave St. Thomas a clinch on the game.

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THE FORESTERS

Catholic Order Chooses Officers and Concludes Business.

Opening of the Triennial Session of the Supreme Court I. O. F. at Toronto.

Brantford, Ont., Aug. 26.—The fourth annual convention of the Ontario Provincial Order of the Catholic Foresters, which opened yesterday afternoon at the Hotel St. James, concluded its work yesterday. Wednesday afternoon's sessions completed the regular work, with the exception of the election of officers for the ensuing year. Pembroke was chosen as the next place of meeting, the date being fixed by constitution on the fourth Tuesday in August.

The committee on constitution reported (Rev. Father McDonald, Chrysler, chairman), a clause recommending a change in the constitution to the effect that the high court be requested to collect the revenue which heretofore was collected by the provincial or state court.

Chief Ranger Lee entered upon a lengthy defense of the Ontario Provincial Order, and said that instead of provincial courts seeking to relinquish any powers, they should try and augment them. The clause was defeated. The next clause proposed, an amendment to the constitution, raising the entry fee from \$1.00 to \$1.50 to \$2. This was lost.

In the evening, the local court, No. 534, entertained the delegates and representatives of the courts of the Ancient, Independent and C. M. B. A. to a luncheon at the Kerby House.

The banquet was followed by a luncheon the convention reassembled to elect officers, and continued in session all night and yesterday morning, except for a brief adjournment for breakfast, until the work was completed.

The following are the officers: P. C. R. Chrysler, O. Bousquet, V. P. C. R. L. V. Bachaud, R. S. Arthur Morel, Ottawa; P. T. George W. W. Seguin, Ottawa; provincial trustees, Messrs. John A. Chisholm, Vincent, Rev. J. J. Feney, O. A. Roque. Nine representatives to the high court were elected.

I. O. F. SUPREME COURT.

Toronto, Aug. 26.—Hundreds of delegates and friends arrived in town to attend the triennial meeting of the Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters. The session opened yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, when Mayor Shaw visited the handsome new temple and gave an address of welcome on behalf of the city, to which Dr. Oronhyatekha and various of the leading clergies appropriately replied.

Mayor Shaw, who is a member of the order, referred in happy terms to the international character of the gathering and to the good feeling which marks the relations between the Canadians and Americans at the present time—a feeling he believed to be deeply rooted. The mayor warmly eulogized the energy and enterprise of the S. C. R. Dr. Oronhyatekha.

The speaker then referred to the importance of individual effort, and referred to the fact that the organization had today in its treasury the large sum of about a million dollars, and was in sight of 150,000 members.

The reports of the C. S. R. and of the supreme secretary were read and adopted, after which the convention adjourned.

In the evening a moonlight excursion was tendered the delegates on Lake Ontario.
