—The Webbing sisters are coming back
to Canada, and will perform in this city and
elsewhere.

—Rev. W. T. Graham, pastor of the
First Baptist Church, Montreal, is visiting
in the city.

—It is expected that Col. Lindsay, of
St. Thomas, will be gazetted commander of
the Seventh Battalion, London, on Satur-
day.

—This is the last day for paying the first
installment of city taxes. To all taxes now
due not paid today five cents on the dollar
will be added.

—Someone called at the residence of Mr.
R. B. Walker, High street, South London,
Tuesday in the family's absence and took
£15 from a trunk.

—Mrs. Cox and her daughter Clara, of
the Pipe Line road, hope to have no further
trouble with the former's husband, Thomas.
The assault case preferred by the two
women were settled yesterday upon Cox
agreeing to leave the house.

—Geo. Donaghy, of London West, is to
labor hard for seven days in the county
jail for assaulting R. J. Kearney on Black-
friars street on Aug. 19. Kearney's eye is
still marked with a big scar. Squire Lacey
intends to put a stop to all such rowdism
in the village.

—Thomas W. Foster, a laborer about 35
years of age, was arrested late last night
by Constable J. W. Ward. Foster and his
wife, it appears, have for some time lived
together with Mrs. Vandover, an elderly
lady of 60 years, just east of the city
limits. The property was owned by the
old lady, and she came to Squire Lacey yester-
day and stated that Foster and his wife
had attempted to turn her out. Bail was
asked for.

—RENT.—A owns a farm with part grass
and part chopped, but not cleared up. He
rented the whole lot to B for the season's
pasture. A puts out fire to burn the brush,
and while doing so burns all the grass. Can
A make B pay for the pasture when
burned? Ans.—Only for the time he used
it. 2. If the cattle got their feet burned
can B hold A for the damage? Ans.—Yes.
3. Is there any month in the year forbid-
ding the setting out of fire to clear land?
Ans.—The municipal council has power to
pass a bylaw regulating the time. Inquire
of your township clerk if any such bylaw
is in force.

—A Windsor dispatch says: "The Bishop
of Huron has summoned Rev. G. W. Wye,
of Amherstburg, to appear before him in
London, Sept. 12, to have passed on him
the finding of the commission appointed by
his lordship in April last, to hear evidence
in the charge preferred against Wye,
alleging that 'his usefulness in the parish
appears to be gone.' It is said that the
commission recommended to the bishop
that Mr. Wye's license be canceled and he
be removed from the parish of Amherst-
burg. It is not known if the bishop will
exercise his power and appoint Mr. Wye to
some other parish."

—A number of those interested in the
promotion of child-saving work in this
Province have suggested the holding of a
conference in Toronto, at which methods of
work might be considered. It has been de-
cided to hold such a meeting on Oct. 18 and
19. Without going fully into the matters
that will engage attention, the following
might be mentioned as worthy of thought:
Existing Provincial and Dominion laws for
the protection and education of children;
the child and the institution; the foster-home
method; the supervision of placed-out chil-
dren. A fare-and-one-third railroad rate
will be secured, and a very profitable meet-
ing may be looked forward to.

—The funeral of Mr. John Hyslop, the
young and popular West Nisourri farmer
who met such a terrible death on King
street Monday afternoon, took place from
St. Stephen's undertaking establishment
yesterday. The attendance of friends and
relatives was very large, and included the
majority of the farmers in the vicinity of
the deceased's home. Rev. Mr. Cook,
pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Dor-
chester Station, conducted a most solemn
service, in which touching references were
made to Mr. Hyslop's many good quali-
ties. Friends of the deceased sent nume-
rous beautiful floral offerings. The pall-
bearers were Messrs. Isaac Saul, Robert
Geddes, H. Brownlee, Geo. Holland, Geo.
Cole and R. Birrell. Interment took place
in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

—PETROLEA.—A fraternal society calls a
convention and one party wishes to retain
the old president, the other elects a new
one by proxy voting and counting votes of
delegates not present. Is it legal? What
should the old party do to retain their
president? They have paid for the charter,
but have not got it. Can they demand it
from the president or a return of the money?
The old president holds the papers, can the
others take legal steps to compel them to
be given up? Can they initiate members
under the old president, and who are in his
favor and can a majority go on as before?
Ans.—The constitution of the society
should provide a remedy, if it does not and
if it does not allow of proxy votes the elec-
tion of the new president is null and void
and the old president may retain office. An
injunction could be obtained to prevent the
new president interfering with the old one
and the motion or trial of the action would
test the legality of the proceedings. An
action by the new president against the old
one to recover the papers would effect the
same object. The president must either
return the money or deliver the charter.
The majority can go on under the old presi-
dent. The majority in such societies has
the control if it chooses to exercise it. The

Will Hear More Candidates.

The Presbyterians of South London as-
sembled in Knox Church last night for the
purpose of extending a call to a pastor as
successor to Rev. Jas. Ballantyne, recently
removed to Ottawa. Rev. J. Allister Mur-
ray acted as moderator. Of the ten candi-
dates who had been heard, two were not
eligible for election as they had already re-
ceived calls elsewhere. These were Rev.
Mr. Muir, of McGill College, Montreal,
and Rev. Mr. Guthrie, from Nova Scotia.

The remaining eight were voted upon, and
of the total of 18 Rev. Wm. Cooper received
56 votes and Rev. Mr. Dickie 45. The re-
maining six received about an equal num-
ber. A motion was then offered to make
the call to Rev. Mr. Cooper unanimous, but
it was defeated on a vote of 59 to 31, and
it was finally decided to postpone action
pending the further hearing of applicants.
Salvation Army Happenings.

the general are: Port Arthur, Jan. 16;
Barrie, Jan. 19 and 20; Guelph, Jan. 21;
Palmerston, Jan. 22; Stratford, Jan. 23;
Chatham, Jan. 24; Windsor, Jan. 25; Brant-
ford, Jan. 30; Hamilton, Jan. 31; Toronto,
Feb. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

Where Was the Fire?

The suddenness with which the city was
overhung with smoke yesterday afternoon
at 4 o'clock gave rise to a great deal of talk
about bush fires, etc. Rumors of every
kind were floated, and one which created a
great deal of anxiety was to the effect that
the village of Lucan was destroyed and
that farmers in the neighborhood were
suffering to a great extent. This report
was brought in by a farmer from Biddulph,
but was not verified.

Another report stated that fires were
raging along the Grand Trunk west of the
city, and that the smoke was thick enough
to impede the progress of trains. Rail-
waymen arriving in a late hour had seen
no sign whatever of forest fires.

A report was current in Brantford that
the bush on the Indian reserve was burn-
ing, and also the Benwell swamp near
Princeton.

Lighting London.

The lighting of this city is a matter which
has greatly perplexed No. 3 committee
from the beginning of the year. Nearly
every meeting night communications are
read asking for lights, but they have all
been laid over awaiting the renewal
of the contract. It was evident
to the committeemen, too, that some
of the lights asked were unnecessary and
a trip of inspection was taken last night.

The entire committee was present, except-
ing the mayor, and were accompanied by
the engineer, Secretary Bell and Mr. Hunt,
the manager of the Canadian General Elec-
tric Light Company. From 8 to 11 the
party was on the move and suc-
ceeded in covering Nos. 2, 4 and
five wards. Ald. Coe's ward (No. 2) was
found to be badly in need of lamps in many
places, while Nos. 4 and 5 are very well
supplied. A number of places asking for
lamps were visited, and in more than one
it was found that there were under half a
dozen houses in the vicinity. The alder-
men were weary, covered with dust and
ready for a good night's rest when they
completed their trip.
