British Elections Continue to
Show Large Liberal Losses.Tories Expect a Majority Independent
of the Unionists.Deputy Demblon Creates a Sensation
in the Belgian Parliament.Significant Speech by Premier
Crispi in the Italian Senate.Mrs. Stambouloff Sumbs Prince F
nand's Representative.

WEDNESDAY'S RETURNS.

London, July 17.—The latest returns show the election of 223 Conservatives, 42 Unionists, 62 Liberals, 28 Anti-Parliamentaries, and 6 Parallels. The total gains thus far are: Conservatives, 40; Unionists, 14; and Liberals, 10, making the net Liberal gain 44 seats. The story of the polls today was much the same as on previous days. The Unionists continue to gain seats, increase their former majority, and where unable to oust Liberals they materially reduce the latter's figures.

A factor in today's election, however, was the running of an Independent-Labor candidate, who polled 607 votes, most of which were drawn from the Liberals. The same conditions prevailed in Derbyshire, where the Labor candidate polled upwards of 1,000 votes, very materially affecting the vote for the Liberal, who retained his seat, but with a loss of 575 votes. Glasgow has returned five Unionists and two Liberals. When Mr. Gladstone went to the country on home rule the Liberals secured six of the seven seats. Among the more prominent Liberals who failed of election today were Sir Charles Cameron, the champion of Scottish disestablishment, who was defeated in the College division of Glasgow by Sir J. Stirling Maxwell.

The Conservatives hope to have in the next House a majority sufficiently large to render them independent of the Liberal Unionists, and this despite the offensive references to a fusion of the parties made before Parliament was dissolved.

Mr. Burt, the successful candidate, has represented Morpeth in the House of Commons since February, 1874, and this is the first time since then that there has been any opposition to his re-election. FLOAT INTO POWER ON BEER.

The Daily News, the principal Liberal organ, will tomorrow say: "The polls in London resulted in the return of eight Liberals and fifty-one Tories, and exceeded the wildest expectations of the Tories. The elections turned almost exclusively on local option. Numbers of Liberals refused to support the par-

ty while this fatal measure was on its programme. It is 1874 over again. Lord Salisbury's Government, like Lord Beaconsfield's, floats into power on beer."

JOHN MORLEY DEFEATED.

London, July 18.—The Liberals received the news of another serious defeat this morning when it was announced that Mr. John Morley, who was Chief Secretary for Ireland under the Rosebery Government, had been defeated at Newcastle-on-Tyne, where 12,398 votes were cast. He received 11,128 votes less yesterday than he did when re-elected in 1892.

THE EDITOR'S OUTING.

Berlin, July 17.—According to the newspapers of this city, Baron Von Hammerstein, the former editor of the Kreuzzeitung, left this city on July 12 with his family, after announcing that he was going away for a holiday. It is added that his property has already been seized for debt.

NO RESPECTER OF ROYALTY.

Brussels, July 17.—A scene of great excitement occurred in the Chamber of Deputies today, when M. Demblon, Socialist, in the course of his speech, declared that although the Belgian royal family had come to Belgium as poor as rats, they had become enormously rich from the sweat of the poor of the country. A prolonged uproar ensued, and the President ordered M. Demblon to withdraw his words, but the Deputy refused to retract a single word.

SNUBBED THE SOVEREIGN.

Sofia, Bulgaria, July 17.—The condition of ex-Premier Stambouloff has grown worse, and symptoms of cerebral affection have developed. Doctors in attendance upon the patient give no hope of his recovery. A reward of 10,000 francs has been offered for the discovery of his assailants.

THE REPRESENTATIVE OF PRINCE FERDINAND called at the residence of M. Stambouloff today to express the sovereign's sympathy and condolence, but Madame Stambouloff refused to receive him or hold any communication with him.

NEITHER CONCORDAT NOR COMBAT WANTED.

Rome, July 17.—The Senate, by a considerable majority today approved the

bill making Sept. 22 the anniversary of the surrender of their arms and evacuation of Rome by the Papal troops of the national fête day. In the course of the debate of the measure Premier Crispi said the bill was important as a declaration of Italy's policy towards the Vatican. The Government, he said, desired neither a concordat nor a combat. They would, however, faithfully observe the law of guarantees to the Pope as the head of a religion that had greater freedom in Italy than it had in France or Austria. The Pope had triumphed in the Kulturkampf in Germany because Italy had put him into an unassailable position, whereupon Prince Bismarck, then the Chancellor of the German Empire, had said to him (Crispi): "You have wrapped him up in cotton so nobody can attack him."

Signor Crispi concluded by saying that it was through liberty they peace between the State and the Church must be realized. The Premier's speech was received with cheers.

STAMBOULOFF DEAD.

Sofia, July 18.—Ex-Premier Stambouloff is dead.

CHINESE ACTUALLY FIGHT.

Hong Kong, July 18.—A large force of Black Flags recently attacked the Japanese troops at Tokoham, Island of Formosa, and fought with desperate courage. The Japanese were only saved from defeat by the superior discipline of their troops. They were finally compelled to retreat before the onslaught of the Chinese. When these advances left the Black Flags were advancing to attack Tokoham, and another battle was imminent.
