A RAILROAD EXPERT. Practical Accomplishments of Frank

Thomson, Pennsylvania's New President. Mr. Frank Thomson, who succeeds the late George B. Roberts as president of the Pennsylvania railroad, is well equipped by education, lifelong training and wide experience for the position. He was bown at Chambersburg, Pa., July 5, 1841, and received his education at the Chambersburg my. At the age of 17 he entered the shops of the Pennsylvania railroad at Altoona. He soon attracted the attention of Thomas A Scott then general superintendent, who thereafter took a special in-

When Mr. Scott was made a colonel at the outbreak of the war and was summoned to aid the government in transporting troops, he had Mr. Thomson detailed for duty in the military railway department. For the next three years he was kept busy repairing the damage done by the Confederate troops and sending the Federal forces to the front. He assisted Colonel Scott in the greatest transportation movement of the war, aiding in the transfer of two entire army corps from the Army of the Potomac to the Army of the Cumberland.

In 1864 Mr. Thomson resigned his military position at the request of the directors and was appointed superintendent of the eastern division of the railroad. In 1866 he was temporarily detailed to manage the Opera Cigar Store Oil Creek railroad during the oil excitement, and in 1871 he was appointed agent by the Russian government to attend the Grand Duke Alexis on a long railroad trip in this country. Mr. Thomson ran a special train for his distinguished passenger for 6,000 miles without a single mishap In 1873 Mr. Thomson was promoted to
