Windup of the Business of the Past

Among the Various Anglican Churches -A Prosperous Showing.

St. James', South London. At the adjourned meeting of the St. James' (South London) vestry, there was an interesting discussion over the question of pews and also the enlarge-

ment of the church. Some of the members of the congregation of St. James' are in favor of free pews, while others favor the retention of pews by members and the removal of the cards and plates bearing the names of the lessees.

Mr. M. J. Kent supported the latter idea, while Mr. E. A. White said it was a question of free the excellent financial showing. pews, a new church, or an addition to the present strucnil. Only 36 cars were inspected last ture. "It does not matter to me which winter. Wheat returns for last week way it goes," said Mr. White. "I like a regular place to sit in in church, but if the question is between free pews and a new church building, I would by all means go for the former."

Mr. Charles B. Hunt, seconded by Mr. B. S. Murray, offered a motion which met with general favor, and ended the discussion. It was "That the present envelope system, inaugurated last year, be continued, and that the tickets and plates be removed, except where parties object.' "There are some old members who

say they will leave the church if the plates are taken from their pews," said Mr. J. M. Dillon. Archdeacon Davis expressed the opinion that the adoption of the motion would result in a great difficuty being

overcome. Mr. Dillon introduced the subject of church extension, by moving that the ladies of the congregation be empowered to ascertain what amount they could raise for the purpose, and report to the vestry. He knew of one lady who would give \$1,000, while only

\$3,500 would be required. Mr. Kent considered that before any steps were taken the vestry should be firmly convinced that more accommodation was absolutely necessary. He also thought it absurd to talk about extensions when the church was not free of debt. While appreciating the zeal of the ladies, he was of the opinion that they could put their efforts to better use by endeavoring to clear off the present encumbrance. "I do not think anything in the way of extension could be undertaken this

year," said Archdeacon Davis, and the matter ended. The annual report of the rector stated that some members had been lost by death and many by removal from the parish, but many new ones were received. The various branches of the church work were well conducted, and the Sunday school was prospering, under the supervision of a capable superintendent and a good staff of teachers. During the year the rector conducted 54 baptisms, 11 marriages, officiated at 18 funerals, and paid 1,357 visits; 30 persons were confirmed, and the total number of communicants was 1,623. On motion of Mr. Hunt, the wardens ere empowered to engage a choirmaster and organist, at a salary not

to exceed \$300 a year. The salary of the sexton, Mr. Tuke, was increased from \$225 to \$200 a year. Mr. Tuke has been in the church service for twelve years, and has proven a very faithful officer.

The wardens will consider the ad-

visability of taking two special collections for the choir boys. "The congregation has taken a very slight interest in the choir," said Dr. Bayly, who spoke for the boys, "and a better re-muneration for their services would make the choir boys behave better, attend practice more regularly, and sing more readily.' Numerous repairs and alterations were decided upon, including the dis-

ing fixtures.
