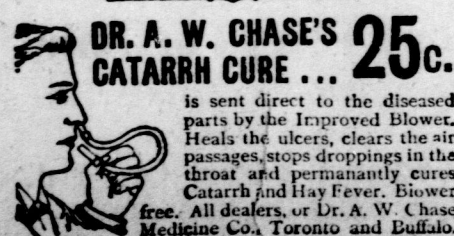

THE "LORD'S DAY WEEK" Nature and How to Assist Her

This Year It Will Be From April 19 to 26.

The Alliance Gives Reasons for Its Observance.

"Lord's Day Week" will be, this year, April 19 to 26, and in reference to it the Lord's Day Alliance has issued the following:

"Lord's Day Week" has won as prominent a place in the thought of evangelical Christianity as the week of prayer, throughout at least the Anglo-Saxon world. In Britain, the United States and Canada it is quite generally observed. It always begins with the first Sunday after Easter (April 12). It therefore begins with Sunday, April 19. All societies having for their object the preservation of the Lord's Day have united in an earnest call for the observance of the 25th Lord's Day Week on the above dates. Someone may ask, "Why a Lord's Day Week at all?" We may answer:

1. Because there is a special need of a revival of reverence for the Lord's Day. The divine authority of the Sabbath law is called in question or openly denied. The day itself is observed by many, even Christian people, with growing looseness. Attendance at divine service is giving place to social, reading, social, gatherings or pleasure-seeking. What wonder, therefore, if the worldly and non-religious, without hesitation or apology, make the holy day of God a holiday of the world? If God's Day be dishonored, neither his word nor his name nor other sacred thing will long be revered. Does the twentieth century need anything more than a revival of reverence?

2. Because there is serious danger of the Lord's Day, as a national Canadian institution, being impaired, and of its becoming a day of business and toil for large numbers of the people. Many corporations yield to the "pressure of business" and make use of the Lord's Day to get relief and to increase their profits. Especially is this true of foreign concerns, which, not content with an effort to secure their share of our phenomenal natural wealth, openly scout our religious convictions and defy our laws. Imported labor, too—American, European and Asiatic—is ready too often to enter seven-day-in-the-week bondage for the money there is in it, and not a few Canadians will work on the Lord's Day rather than risk losing employment. Between 100,000 and 150,000 in Canada already have no Sabbath rest.

3. Because a general effort, at one season, throughout the country, by all who value the Lord's Day, is bound to make an impression upon the public mind that will last. How shall we observe Lord's Day Week? What use can we make of it? In other years it has been used in the following ways, which may be regarded as suggestions to those desiring such:

1. Special sermons are preached on the Lord's Day, and Christian people encouraged specially to pray for its better observance.
2. Some special reference is made in Sunday school urging upon the children the claims of the Lord's Day, its sacredness or its benefits.
3. The same is done in Y. P. S. S. Y. M. C. A. S. W. C. T. U. S., etc.
4. Lord's Day Alliance executives arrange for union meetings in their center or vicinity.
5. Labor councils or unions arrange for meetings for discussion of the question of the labor viewpoint, and for the emphasizing of the workman's special interest in the weekly rest day.
There is no better time in the year than just before the summer season, with its special temptations to Sabbath desecration.

A CINCINNATI TRAGEDY

Husband, Wife and Child Found Dead in Their Home.

Cincinnati, March 24.—A mysterious tragedy, which occurred here Saturday night, when the bodies of A. M. Betty, local representative of the Washburn-Crosby mills, of Minneapolis, his wife, and their son, 20 months old, were found at their home on GIPart avenue. A note written by Betty was found. In his wife's hand, it read: "I killed the baby, and the police think the woman may have killed herself and the child on account of domestic trouble. It is stated that divorce proceedings had been instituted, but were withdrawn before the birth of the child. As Betty was known to have been playing cards near his home Saturday night at midnight, it is thought that he found the dead bodies on his return home, and that he then deliberately took his own life. RIOTS IN TRINIDAD

A Mob Attempts to Burn Government Buildings.

Kingstown, St. Vincent, March 24.—A serious riot was in progress at 2:30 p.m. yesterday at Port of Spain, Trinidad, according to a dispatch just received from that city. A mob attempted to burn the Government buildings there, and the police had to fire on the rioters, killing or wounding several among them. The British cruiser Palas, at the time the dispatch was sent, was landing bluejackets.

The rioting was due to the refusal of the Government to withdraw an ordinance concerning the new waterworks. A demonstration was made during today's meeting of the executive council, and finally the mob stoned the Government building and set fire to it. The riot act was read and the police fired on the mob. The city is in a state of great excitement.

BUSINESS DAY IN THE COMMONS

Several Minor Bills Get Their First Reading.

INQUIRIES, NOTICES OF MOTION

The Government Is Considering the Introduction of Rural Mail Delivery.

Ottawa, March 24.—At the commencement of proceedings in the house yesterday, Mr. James H. Ross, the newly-elected member for Yukon, was introduced by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Scott (West Assiniboia), amid applause from the Government benches. The first reading was given bills introduced by Mr. Bernier (St. Jean and Ibeville) to amend the supreme court and exchequer court acts, and to indemnify those who suffer damages in consequence of fires caused by railways; also a bill introduced by Mr. Thompson (Heldmann) to extend the power of loan companies.

In answer to questions, Mr. Jabel Robinson was told that the Government had under consideration the question of introducing a system of free rural mail delivery.
Mr. McGowan was informed that the Government had no intention of introducing legislation regarding private bankers.
Mr. P. D. Tyerman has received considerable sums since 1878 from the Interior, Agricultural and Indian Departments in connection with services for a quarantine in the Northwest Territories and inspection of diseased Donkshobers. Mr. Taylor (Leeds) was informed by Mr. Fielding the details of these payments.

Mr. Monk desired information as to a contract for 25,000 tons of steel rails to be delivered in June, 1903.
Mr. Blair said the contracts had been given to a Glasgow firm, the contract not having been yet executed.
The bill respecting immoral and indecent plays was read a second time and put through committee. At the suggestion of Sir Hilbert Tupper the word "obscene" was substituted for "immoral and indecent."

NOTICES OF MOTION.

Mr. Brock will introduce a bill to amend the criminal code so as to make further provision for the prevention of cruelty to animals.
Mr. Davis (Saskatchewan) gives notice of motion that it is absolutely essential in the interests of the country at large, and particularly of the Northwest Territories, to take at once some steps to increase the transportation facilities of the territories, owing to the immense immigration to that country and the prospective products arising therefrom.
Mr. Boyd will move "that this house is of the opinion that Parliament should be summoned for the dispatch of business on or about the last Thursday in November in each and every year."
The house remained all the evening in supply, taking up civil, Government, railway and public works estimates.
