MUSIC AND DRAMA

THE CURTAIN WILL RISE AT 8 O'CLOCK AT "THE CARDINAL" TONIGHT.

She played Alice Faulkner throughout the engagement, with pronounced success, the critics having many kind words for her art, while the public showed rapturous applause.
