HUNTING AND OTHER CASUALTIES

Number of Persons Killed by Bad Marksmen.

One of Twin Daughters Drowned in a Cistern—Suicide of a Canadian Nurse at Meriden, Conn.

Detroit, Oct. 29.—Hunting accidents give the coroners and doctors plenty of business throughout the state. At Lansing Gus Achtenberg and Smith Clawson went out shooting and were returning in an automobile. Achtenberg's dog was lying in front of them, and when it tried to get up Achtenber told the animal to lie down and he made a motion toward him with his hand. In some way he either hit the hammer of his gun or the dog did, and the discharge blew Achtenberg's face half off, death being instantane-

Stanley Chappel, aged 17, of Clare, was instantly killed by the discharge of a gun he was carrying while hunting vesterday.

Charles Sabotta, aged 19, was hunting a few miles from Big Rapids. While standing on a log his gun slipped, the charge passing along the side of his body from the abdomen to the top of his head. Part of his face was shot off and his recovery is doubtful. A few days since a farmer in an adjoining township was killed by a similar accident.

Samuel Gay, hotel proprietor at Rockwood, was out after quail with his brother. They found a bevy and just as they got up Gay shot, and his wife emerged from around the pile at the same instant, having gone to meet him. The charge struck her in the face and 26 shot entered her body The sight of one eye is destroyed and it is feared the other will be lost. Her condition is critical.

Charles Palmer, while hunting near Hillsdale, accidentally shot and instantly killed Charles W. Hagan, foreman in the shoe factory.

An accidental discharge of Leonard Mee's gun in the brush near Manistee struck his cousin, Bob Leonard, in the right knee. Leonard's leg was amputated, and he died from the shock and loss of blood.



French Figures of the War.

A compilation from the files of a prominent pro-Boer Parisian journal shows some remarkable statistics. It has reported 1.101 battles, the principal results being: Boer losses, killed, 181 men, including 23 officers; captured, 300 men and 17 officers. British losses, killed, 3,189,180 men, including 60,000 officers; captured, 190,000 men and 8,000 officers. Boer guns captured, 14; horses and mules, 30; provision trains, 42. British guns captured, 2,160; horses and mules, 7,000; provision trains, 813. Decisive Boer victories, 1,094; decisive British victories, 7. Boer forces pur-sued by the British, 121 miles; British forces pursued by Boers, 26,118 miles. Boer general killed, nil; British generals killed, 71, including five who were killed three times, and one (Gen. Methuen) who was killed seven times during the first four months of the war. Gen. Kelly-Kenny had his head blown off in three separate engage-ments, succinctly described by the paper's correspondents; and before leaving for home Gen. Lord Roberts had lost five legs and nine right arms. Up to the beginning of October, Lord Kitchener had been assassinated three times by his own men in revenge for the harsh discipline he kept on enforc-
