HUMAN TIME-PIECE

New York Has a Man by Whom Watches Are Regulated.

At least one man in New York earns his living by acting as a human time-piece. This individual, however, cannot be termed unique, for he does not devote himself entirely to watching the time for others, but at noon only, on each business day. He does not earn a regular wage for his labor, the greater part of which depends on faithfulness and punctuality; yet he does collect enough to keep him in tobacco and whisky, and these satisfy his desire for luxuries.

His particular work consists of standing in the middle of Front street, near James ship, a point where he can observe the great ball that is lowered on the Western Union building every day at precisely 12 o'clock. A few minutes before that hour the man takes his stand in the street, and instantly the windows of the surrounding office buildings, the decks of steamers lying at the piers along the East River in sight of the "time-piece," and doors of nearby stores are filled with people, each with watch in hand.

Just a few seconds before the hour is to be designated by the falling of the ball—and the man knows when the exact second will arrive almost as well as he knows the names of the persons who pay him—the "time-piece" raises his right hand perpendicularly above his head. At the instant the ball begins to descend down comes his hand and the man departs, his work finished for that day.

He is said to be invaluable to shop-owners and merchants along the East River water front. They are unable to secure the exact time without inconvenience or the loss of a few precious seconds, which, by aid of the time-telling man, they are enabled to save.—New York Herald.

HUNTING AND OTHER CASUALTIES

Number of Persons Killed by Bad Marksman.

One of Twin Daughters Drowned in a Cistern—Suicide of a Canadian Nurse at Meriden, Conn.

Detroit, Oct. 29.—Hunting accidents give the coroners and doctors plenty of business throughout the state. At Lansing Gus Achtenberg and Smith Clawson went out shooting and were returning in an automobile. Achtenberg's dog was lying in front of them, and when it tried to get up Achtenberg told the animal to lie down and he made a motion toward him with his hand. In some way he either hit the hammer of his gun or the dog did, and the discharge blew Achtenberg's face half off, death being instantaneous.

Stanley Chappel, aged 17, of Clara, was instantly killed by the discharge of a gun he was carrying while hunting yesterday.

Charles Sabotta, aged 19, was hunting a few miles from Big Rapids. While standing on a log his gun slipped, the charge passing along the side of his body from the abdomen to the top of his head. Part of his face was shot off and his recovery is doubtful. A few days since a farmer in an adjoining township was killed by a similar accident.

Samuel Gay, hotel proprietor at Rockwood, was out after quail with his brother. They found a bevy and just as they got up Gay shot, and his wife emerged from around the pile at the same instant, having gone to meet him. The charge struck her in the face and 26 shot entered her body. The sight of one eye is destroyed and it is feared the other will be lost. Her condition is critical.

Charles Palmer, while hunting near Hillsdale, accidentally shot and instantly killed his cousin, Bob Hagin, an accidental discharge of Leonard Mee's gun in the brush near Manitowish struck his cousin, Bob Hagin, in the right knee. Leonard's leg was amputated, and he died from the shock and loss of blood.

Jack Spiers was looking at a new gun at Howard City, and when it went off it hit a little girl named Halls on the top of the head, inflicting a bad scalp wound.

In some manner Ed Alcorn's rifle was discharged in the woods near Thawville. One of them named Antonia Motta, who was more conservative than the others, was shot and so badly wounded that death resulted this morning. A friend of Motta, named John Mottin, was slightly wounded in the leg. The murderer was a rabid anarchist and was trying to induce the men to strike, who fled as soon as he committed the deed.

DROWNED IN A CISTERN.

West Bay City, Mich., Oct. 28.—Ruth, one of the 3-year-old twin daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Walter King, was drowned in a cistern at their home.

A CANADIAN NURSE'S SUICIDE.

Meriden, Conn., Oct. 28.—Miss Alice Ellis, a well-known trained nurse of this city and a graduate of the New Haven hospital, committed suicide in the rear of the residence of the late Dwight H. Wilcox, where she was formerly employed as a governess, early Sunday morning, by inhaling carbon monoxide from a tin in which she had placed her head. Her head was in a black silk bag, lying in the pan, in which she had placed the contents of two pint bottles of chloroform. She was also covered with a golf cape and a red flannel blanket. Miss Ellis was 41 years of age and was in Canada. The only reason for her act is that she was greatly attached to a six-year-old son of Mr. Wilcox, whom she had taken care of from his birth up to last January, when

SUICIDE WITH GAS.

New York, Oct. 28.—The body of a man who registered at Jersey City House as J. J. Waterman, Philadelphia, was found in a gas chamber. He was well dressed, and appeared to be 35 years old. The initial marks on his clothing were "L. L." Written on one of his cuffs were the words, "My God, is there no hope." He had drawn a compass and square, and beneath them a pair of hands raised together as if in prayer. The man used gas to end his life.

KILLED BY CAR.

Oakville, Ont., Oct. 28.—An Italian railway employee named P. Nigancica, working on the Grand Trunk track, was killed two miles east of here this morning. He was struck by a west-bound freight train immediately in front of the fast east-bound express, and was instantly killed.

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 28.—Samuel Landry, while driving down a hill to the railway station at Memmood this afternoon was struck and killed by the C. P. E. express for Halifax.

His horse ran away, upset the wagon and threw Landry in front of the engine.

Kingsville, Oct. 28.—Thos. Davidson, who fell under the L. E. and D. R. coach while trying to board a moving train Saturday night, was taken to Walkerville by a special train and died at the hospital.

DIED FROM A BEATING.

Reading, Pa., Oct. 28.—Annie Etter, aged 15, who was found in a lot early yesterday morning, bruised and bleeding, died at the Reading Hospital today without having regained consciousness. Public opinion is wrought up to high pitch against Geo. Gans, who after being placed under arrest, made a partial confession. Gans admits that he met the girl on Saturday evening, and was conducted by her to a rooming house where he lived. He was safely home, but it is alleged, lured her through an alley into the lot. She resisted his advances and was horribly beaten.
