



LONDON SECOND AS CIGAR MANUFACTURING CENTER

That Only Montreal Makes More of Them.

The inland revenue department, Ottawa, has just issued a blue-book of statistics for the fiscal year ending June 30 last, which contains some data of interest to Londoners. One of the largest items credited to

London is that of cigar manufacturing, the Forest City being the second in importance in that line in the whole Do-minion, and surpassed by only Mon-In the Province of Ontario, London's revenue from cigars is nearly 45 per

cent of that of the whole province, the total being \$426,664 92, of which London's share is \$190,299 18. Toronto follows with \$66,096 78; then cames Hamilton with \$51,980 16; Guelph was fourth with \$33,945 78, and Brantford fifth with \$23,212 17. Montreal, which came first, beat London in duties on cigars by \$118,712 23, having a total of \$289,011 41. Six cities contribute more than London in the matter of raw leaf tobacco.

Government Statistics Show | \$218,797 24. Quebec and Sherbrooke had over \$100,000 duties each. London's total was only \$78,901 43. There were 616,637 pounds imported by London manufacturers; 160,628

pounds remaining in warehouse from last year; 53,242 pounds placed in warehouse, ex-factory; and 13,8231/2 pourels received from other divisions—making a grand total of 844,331 pounds. The amount entered for consumption was 590,362½ pounds, on which \$59,391 13 was collected; 51,000 pounds were exported, and at the end of the year 184,-884 pounds remained in warehouse. The duties paid on malt amounted to \$72,430 69, and \$80,862 48 on spirits. This means that 42,557.31 gallons of spirits were entered for consumption, having 6,842.41 gallons in the ware-house at the end of the year. Five and a half million pounds of grain were placed in steep here, and from this 4,-320,823 pounds of malt were manufactured. The malt liquor manufactured amounted to 1,924,289 gallons. There

were 1,674% gallons exported and used by the army and navy.


